FOREWORD

Different parts of West Bengal are vulnerable to the natural calamities like Flood, Cyclonic Storms, Earthquake, Landslide, Drought and River Embankment Erosion. In fact there are multiple High Risk Multi Hazard Zones.

Apart from these natural hazards there are also chances of man-made disasters or accidents like Major Fire, Industrial Accidents, Terrorist Attacks etc.

This State Disaster Management Plan, West Bengal, has been prepared with an aim to tackle natural disasters with a scientific approach and with the help of understanding. This Plan should be useful to tackle the multi-hazard vulnerabilities taking into consideration the factors like ever-growing population, rapid urbanization, increasing industrialization, development within high risk zones, environmental degradation, climate change, state and national security, economy and sustainable development.

The objective of the State Disaster Management Plan, West Bengal is to facilitate execution of activities for prevention, preparedness, operations, coordination, and community awareness and involvement in respect of natural calamity of the State.

In preparing the Plan, the existing system has been studied, the prevailing documents and various stakeholders were consulted. More than 30 departments have their own disaster management plan.

The framework of the plan is based on the paradigm shift in Management of Disaster from a relief centric approach to preparedness, prevention and mitigation, in terms of the surrounding as laid down in the Disaster Management Act 2005. The team has followed the guidelines for preparing State Disaster Management Plans issued by the National Disaster Management Authority and other State Government's Disaster Management Plans.

It may be noted that West Bengal is the only State where there is a separate Department of Disaster Management and Officers are deployed up to Block level. All the activities related to Disaster being carried out through the Department of Disaster Management and Civil Defence up to the Grass root level. WBSDMA being the highest level constituted body to monitor the activities of the State.

The State Disaster Management Plan is associated with Departmental Disaster Management Plans, District Disaster Management Plans and State Disaster Management Networks. This is a general framework, specialized action points would be available in District Disaster Management Plans and Different Departmental Disaster Management Plans.

This plan will also be available at the departmental website for everyone.

Introduction

This plan will be known as "West Bengal State Disaster Management Plan" and will be applicable in and only in the state of West Bengal.

Background:

The Disaster Management Act, 2005 (DM Act 2005) lays down institutional and coordination mechanism for effective Disaster Management (DM) at the national, state, district and local levels. As mandated by the Act multi-tiered institutional system consisting of the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) headed by the Prime Minister, the State Disaster Management Authorities (SDMAs) headed by the respective Chief Ministers and the District Disaster Management Authorities (DDMAs) headed by the respective District Collectors and co-chaired by Chairpersons of the local bodies has been put in place.

Vision:

The vision is to build a safer and disaster resilient State by developing a holistic, proactive, multi-disaster and technology driven strategy for Disaster Management. This will be achieved through a culture of prevention, mitigation and preparedness to reduce the impact of disasters on people.

West Bengal has 23 Districts covering 68 Sub-divisions, 345 Blocks, 07 Municipal Corporation, 121 Municipalities/ Notified area Authority, 3,339 Gram Panchayats and 508 Police Stations. The total area of the state is 88,752 sq km having a population of nearly 100 million people of which about 68.13 % live in the rural areas with a population density of 1,028 per square kilometer (2,700 per square mile).

This plan is being formulated in the context of both natural and man-made disasters to tackle the multihazard vulnerabilities and is based on the factors like ever-growing population, facilitate to the affected families, rapid urbanization, increasing industrialization, development within high risk zones, environmental degradation, climate change, state and national security, economy and sustainable development.

Theme:

The central themes of this State DM Plan are as follows:

- To study the vulnerability of different parts of the state to different kinds of disasters the measures to be adopted for prevention and mitigation of disasters.
- The manner in which mitigation measures shall be integrated with development plans and projects, i.e. mainstreaming of Disaster Management.
- The capacity building and preparedness measures to be taken.
- The roles and responsibilities of each department of State Government in relation to the measures specified above.
- The roles and responsibilities of different departments of State Government in responding to any threatening disaster situation or disaster.
- Methodologies for the annual review and updating of the state plan.
- Appropriate provisions for financing the measures to be carried out under the state government.
- Availability to the departments of State Government and provision and methodology of such departments to draw up their own plans in accordance with the state plan.

Objectives and Goal of the Plan:

Section 31 of Disaster Management Act 2005, makes it mandatory to have a disaster management plan for every State. SDMP shall include Hazard Risk and Vulnerability Analysis (HRVA), prevention, mitigation, preparedness measures, response plan and procedures. An indicative list with possible plan objectives is given below:

- To identify the areas vulnerable to major types of hazards in the State.
- To adopt proactive measures at State level by all the Govt. Departments to prevent disaster and mitigate its
 effects.
- To define and assign the different tasks and responsibilities to stake holders during the pre- disaster and post-disaster phases of the disaster.
- To enhance resilience of the people in the State by way of capacity building. Reduce the loss of public and private property, especially critical facilities and infrastructure, through proper planning.
- Manage future development to mitigate the effect of natural hazards in the State. To set up an Emergency Operation Centre at the State level to function effectively in search, rescue, and response.
- To develop the standardized mechanism to respond to disaster situation to manage the disaster efficiently.
- To set up the early warning system so as to prepare the community to deal with the disaster and responsive communication system based up on fail-proof proven technology.
- To prepare the response plan based upon the guidelines issued in the State Disaster Management Plan so as to provide prompt relief, rescue and search support in the disaster affected areas.
- To adopt disaster resilient construction mechanism in the State by way of using Information, Education and Communication for making the community aware of the need of disaster resilient infrastructure.
- To make the use of media in disaster management.
- Rehabilitation plan of the affected people and reconstruction measures to be taken by different Government Departments at State level and local authority.
- The State Disaster Management Plan (SDMP) is the guide for achieving the objective of mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery.

Scope:

SDMP envisages to provide a consistent, state wide framework for enabling central, state and local governments and private and public sector institutions to come to a common platform and work together for the cause of mitigation, preparation, response and recovery so as to help the disaster affected community to recover from the effects of emergencies regardless of their cause, size, location or complexity. In accordance with the provisions of DM Act, 2005, this plan is in effect at all times and applies to all levels of state government and its administrative subdivisions; districts, tehsils, blocks, panchayats and villages. The plan incorporates and complies with the principles and requirements of national and state laws, regulations and guidelines.

Sendai Framework

In order to reduce disaster risk, Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR) adopted during 3rd UN World Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction in Sendai, Japan, 2015 envisages a need to address existing challenges and prepare for future ones by focusing on monitoring, assessing, and understanding disaster risk and sharing such information. The SFDRR highlights that it is "urgent and critical to anticipate, plan for and reduce disaster risk" to cope with disaster. It requires strengthening of disaster risk governance and coordination across various institutions and sectors. It requires the full and meaningful participation of relevant stakeholders at different levels. It is necessary to invest in the economic, social, health, cultural and educational resilience at all levels. It requires investments in research and the use of technology to enhance multi-hazard early warning systems (EWS), preparedness, response, recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

The four priorities for action under the SFDRR are:

- 1. Understanding the disaster risk.
- 2. Strengthening disaster risk governance to manage disaster risk.
- 3. Investing in disaster risk reduction for resilience.
- 4. Enhancing disaster preparedness for effective response and to "Build Back Better" in recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

Disasters, Risk Reduction and Management

DM Act, 2005 defines disaster as being a catastrophe, mishap, calamity or grave occurrence in any area, arising from natural or manmade causes or by accident or negligence which results in substantial loss of life or human suffering or damage to and destruction of property or damage to or degradation of environment and is of such a nature or magnitude as to be beyond the coping capacity of the community of the affected area.

Disaster Risk Reduction as UN office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR), consists of a framework of elements that help in minimizing vulnerabilities and disaster risks throughout a society, avoiding (prevention) or limiting (mitigation and preparedness) the adverse impacts of hazards, within the broad context of sustainable development.

DM Act, 2005 defines Disaster Management as a continuous and integrated process of planning, organising, coordinating and implementing measures which are necessary or expedient for

- (i) Prevention of danger or threat of any disaster;
- (ii) Mitigation or reduction of risk of any disaster or its severity or consequence;
- (iii) Capacity building;
- (iv) Preparedness to deal with any disaster;
- (v) Prompt response to any threatening disaster situation or disaster;
- (vi) Assessing the severity or magnitude of effects of any disaster;
- (vii) Evacuation, rescue and relief;
- (viii) Rehabilitation and reconstruction.

Levels of Disasters

The Disaster Management related planning process at various tiers has to take into account the vulnerability of disaster- affected area and the capacity of the authorities to deal with the situation. Using this approach, the High Power Committee and as per the recommendations of the High Power Committee of Government of India (Report of HPC on Disaster Management published in October 2001 by National Centre for Disaster Management, New Delhi), disasters situations categorized into three levels; L1, L2 and L3. The period of normalcy, L0, has to be utilized for Disaster Risk Reduction.

- **L1:** The level of disaster that can be managed with the capabilities and resources at the district level. However, the state authorities are to remain in a state of readiness to provide assistance if needed.
- **L2:** This signifies the disaster situations requiring assistance and active mobilization of resources at the state level and deployment of state level agencies. The central agencies have to remain vigilant for immediate deployment if required by the state.
- L3: This corresponds to a nearly catastrophic situation or a very large-scale disaster that overwhelms State and District authorities.



Agriculture:

Agriculture is the leading occupation in West Bengal. Rice is the state's main food crop. Rice, jute, sugarcane and wheat are the top crops of the state. Tea of Darjeeling and Dooars is also an important commercial crop.

The net cropped area is 52.05 lakh hectares which comprises 68% of the geographical area and 92% of arable land. The cropping intensity is 190%.

The Disaster Management Act 2005 provides the legal and institutional framework for disaster management

Institutional Arrangements for Disaster Management (DM)

in India at the national, state and district levels. In the National Policy of India, the primary responsibility of disaster management vests with the State Governments. The Central Government lays down policies and guidelines and provides technical, financial and logistic support while the district administration carries out most of the operations in collaboration with central and state level agencies.

State Disaster Management Authority:

Section 14 of DM Act 2005 mandates each State to establish State Disaster Management Authority (SDMA). At the State Level the State Disaster Management Authority (SDMA), headed by the Chief Minister, lays down policies and plans for disaster management in the State. Being the nodal agency for disaster management, it is also responsible to coordinate the implementation of the State Plan, recommend provision of funds for mitigation and preparedness measures and review the developmental plans of the different departments of the State to ensure integration of prevention, preparedness and mitigation measures in their respective plan.

Powers and functions of State Authority:

- (a) Lay down the State disaster management policy;
- (b) Approve the State Plan in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the National Authority;
- (c) Approve the disaster management plans prepared by the departments of the Government of the State;
- (d) Lay down guidelines to be followed by the departments of the Government of the State for the purposes of integration of measures for prevention of disasters and mitigation in their development plans and projects and provide necessary technical assistance there for;
- (e) Coordinate the implementation of the State Plan;
- (f) Recommend provision of funds for mitigation and preparedness measures;
- (g) Review the development plans of the different departments of the State and ensure that prevention and mitigation measures are integrated therein;
- (h) Review the measures being taken for mitigation, capacity building and preparedness by the departments of the Government of the State and issue such guidelines as may be necessary.

Constituted by Government Order No. - 2181-FR dated 29th November, 2011 published in Gazette Notification dated- 07th December, 2011 the composition of SDMA is as given below.

State Executive Committee:

The State Executive Committee with State Chief Secretary as Chairperson (ex officio) and four Secretaries to the Government of the State of such departments as the State Government may think fit as ex officio members.

Formation/ Composition of West Bengal SEC:

The Chief Secretary to the Government of West Bengal- Ex-officio Chairperson

The Secretary, Home Department. - Member.

The Secretary, Finance Department. - Member.

The Secretary, Irrigation & Waterways Department.-Member.

The Secretary, Disaster Management & Civil Defence Department.-Member.

Functions of the State Executive Committee (As per section 22 of DM Act 2005):

- 1. The State Executive Committee shall have the responsibility for implementing the National Plan and State Plan and act as the coordinating and monitoring body for management of disaster in the State.
- 2. Without prejudice to the generality of the provisions of subsection (1), the State Executive Committee may
 - a. coordinate and monitor the implementation of the National Policy, the National Plan and the State Plan;
 - b. examine the vulnerability of different parts of the State to different forms of disasters and specify measures to be taken for their prevention or mitigation;
 - c. lay down guidelines for preparation of disaster management plan by the departments of the Government of the State and the District Authorities:
 - d. monitor the implementation of disaster management plans prepared by the departments of the Government of the State and District Authorities;
 - e. monitor the implementation of the guidelines laid down by the State Authority for integrating of measures for prevention of disasters and mitigation by the departments in their development plans and projects;
 - f. evaluate preparedness at all governmental or non-governmental levels to respond to any threatening disaster situation or disaster and give directions, where necessary, for enhancing such preparedness;
 - g. coordinate response in the event of any threatening disaster situation or disaster;
 - h. give directions to any Department of the Government of the State or any other authority or body in the State regarding actions to be taken in response to any threatening disaster situation or disaster;
 - i. promote general education, awareness and community training in regard to the forms of disasters to which different parts of the State are vulnerable and the measures that may be taken by such community to prevent the disaster, mitigate and respond to such disaster;
 - j. advice, assist and coordinate the activities of the Departments of the Government of the State, District Authorities, statutory bodies and other governmental and non- governmental organizations engaged in disaster management;
 - k. provide necessary technical assistance or give advice to District Authorities and local authorities for carrying out their functions effectively;
 - I. advise the State Government regarding all financial matters in relation to disaster management;
 - m. examine the construction, in any local area in the State and, if it is of the opinion that the standards laid for such construction for the prevention of disaster is not being or has not been followed, may direct the District Authority or the local authority, as the case may be, to take such action as may be necessary to secure compliance of such standards;
 - n. provide information to the National Authority relating to different aspects of disaster management;
 - o. lay down, review and update State level response plans and guidelines and ensure that the district level plans are prepared, reviewed and updated;
 - p. ensure that communication systems are in order and the disaster management drills are carried out periodically;
 - q. perform such other functions as may be assigned to it by the State Authority or as it may consider necessary;

State Disaster Response Force (SDRF):

In accordance with Sec. 44 of Disaster Management Act, 2005 National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) is formed by the Government of India to ensure specialized response during disaster incidences. As per Section 3.4.5 of National Policy on Disaster Management, 2009, the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) was constituted for quickly responding to disasters. These SDRF are placed strategically at suitable locations well connected to the airport, rail heads and roads for their immediate deployment at the disaster sites. In West Bengal Disaster Management Groups (DMG) were constituted for Kolkata and DMG–Bengal. DMG Kolkata has its HQ at PTS, Kolkata

Set up of Disaster Management Group Squads, West Bengal Police (vide order no. 1 of 18.01.2013 of DG & IG of Police, West Bengal)

At present, there are 07 (seven) self-contained Squads in DMG, WBP. These Squads are stationed at:-

- (i) State Armed Police (SAP) 4th Battalion, Kasba, (near Raiganj town), Uttar Dinajpur.
- (ii) SAP 6th & Special Striking Force Bn., Barrackpore, North 24 Parganas.
- (iii) SAP 7th Bn., Asansol, Paschim Burdwan.
- (iv) SAP 8th Bn., Barrackpore, North 24 Parganas.
- (v) SAP 9th Bn., Sandhya (near Krishnanagar town), Nadia.
- (vi) SAP 10th & 12th Bn., Dabgram (near Siliguri town), Jalpaiguri.
- (vii) SAP 13th Bn., Barjora, District Bankura...

Each DMG Squad consists of 5(five) specialized Teams. These Teams are:-

- (i) Collapse Structure Search & Rescue Team (CSSR).
- (ii) Medical First Responder Team (MFR).
- (iii) Deep Diving/Surface Water Rescue Team: Deep Diving Teams are at Barrackpore & Krishnanagar whereas rests of the Squads have Surface Water Rescue Teams.
- (iv) Mountaineering/Rock Climbing Team: (Each such team is only located at Kasba, Dabgarm & Barjora)
- (v) High Rise Building Team.

The strength of each self-contained squad is 01 Inspector, 02 SIs, 08 ASIs and 70 Police Constables. All the seven Squads of DMG, WBP have been nominated & enlarged to the above capacity. DMG Constables are young, energetic and physically fit, with an average age group of below 30 years.

District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA):

Under Section 25 of Disaster Management Act 2005, there will be a District Disaster Management Authority in each District of a State. Each DDMA will be headed by the respective District Magistrate, District Collector (DC), Dy. Commissioner as the case may be, with the elected representative of the Local Authority as the Co-Chairperson. DDMA will act as the planning, coordinating and implementing body for DM at District level and take all necessary measures for the purposes of DM in accordance with the Guidelines laid down by the NDMA and SDMA. It will, inter alia, prepare the District DM plan for the District and monitor the implementation of the National Policy, the State Policy, the National Plan, and the State Plan concerning its own District and prepare the District Plan. The DDMA will also ensure that the Guidelines for prevention, mitigation, preparedness and response measures lay down by NDMA and SDMA are followed by all Departments of the State Government, at the District level and the Local Authorities in the District. The District Disaster Management Authorities of eighteen (18) Districts under West Bengal were constituted vide notification numbers 1286-FR to 1303-FR dated 1st August, 2007 of Disaster Management Department, West Bengal. Another four DDMAs for newly formed four districts (4) were constituted vide notification number 3507-RL/O/VI/7M-108/07dated 13th November, 2017 and DDMA for district of Kolkata was constituted vide notification number 115-RL/O/VI/7M-108/07dated 18th January, 2018 of Disaster Management & Civil Defence Department, West Bengal.

State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC):

EOC is an off-site facility functioning from State / District HQ. The EOC will take stock of the emerging situation and assist the incident managers in mobilizing the respective line department's resources, manpower and

expertise along with appropriate delegated authorities for the on-scene actions/ response. State EOC will keep the DEOC and field EOC informed of the changing situation and support extended. The basic functions of EOC, derived on the basis of functional framework of disaster management would be to:

- Receive, monitor, and assess disaster information;
- Keep track of available resources;
- Monitor, assess, and track response units and resource requests. Manage resource deployment for optimal usage;
- Make policy decisions and proclaim local emergencies as needed;
- Provide direction and management for EOC operations through Standard Operations Guide (SOG), set priorities and establish strategies;
- Coordinate operations of all responding units, including law enforcement, fire, medical, logistics etc.;
- Augment comprehensive emergency communication from EOC to any field operation when needed or appropriate;
- Maintain EOC security and access control;
- Provide recovery assistance in response to the situations and available resources Keep senior, subordinate and tenant officials informed;
- Keep local area (Village/Town/City, District and State) informed. Operate a message centre to log and post all key disaster information. Develop and disseminate public information warnings and instructions

The EOC is equipped with state-of-the-art, redundant communication systems including landline phones, cell phones, satellite phones, internet, fax and other facilities.

The new EOC is set up of Disaster Management Department of Nabanna and functioning properly.

The technological up gradations included the following particulars:

- · High Resolution Video Display Wall.
- Multiple computer nodes, GIS mapping incident management and assistance.
- Display Management System.
- · Civil and Electrical Works.

CHAPTER 3

Hazard Vulnerability Risk Assessment: West Bengal

In Disaster Management, risk is measured in terms of loss of human lives, loss of capital, property like agricultural land, roads, structures, livestock etc.


Hazard is potentially a damaging physical event, phenomenon, or human activity that may cause the loss of life or injury, property damage, social and economic disruption, or environmental degradation. Hazards can include latent conditions that may represent future threats and can have different origins: natural (geological, hydrometeorological and biological) or induced by human processes (environmental degradation and technological hazards). Hazards can be single, sequential or combined in their origin and effects. Each hazard is characterized by its location, intensity, frequency and probability.

Vulnerability is the internal weakness of a system from external threats and in disaster perspective, it is the conditions determined by physical, social, economic, and environmental factors or processes, which increase the susceptibility of a community to the impact of hazards. It is the degree of loss (from 0 to100 per cent) resulting from a potentially damaging phenomenon. It is the degree to which a person, system or unit is likely to experience harm due to exposure to stresses. **Risk** is the probability of harmful consequences, or expected losses (deaths, injuries, property, livelihoods, economic activity disrupted or environment damaged) resulting from interactions between natural or human-induced hazards and vulnerable conditions.

The process of conducting a risk **Analysis** is based on a review of both the technical features of hazards such as their location, intensity, frequency and probability; and also the analysis of the physical, social, economic and environmental dimensions of vulnerability and exposure, while taking particular account of the coping capabilities pertinent to the risk scenarios.

The guiding principles of **Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction** state that Disaster Risk Reduction requires responsibilities to be shared by different divisions of governments and various agencies. The effectiveness in disaster risk reductions dependent on coordination mechanisms within and across sectors and with relevant stakeholders at all levels. For each hazard, the approach used in this plan incorporates the four priorities enunciated in the Sendai Framework in to the planning frame work for DRR under the five thematic areas for action:

- 1. Understanding risk
- 2. Inter-agency coordination
- 3. Investing in Disaster Risk Reduction-Structural measures
- 4. Investing in Disaster Risk Reduction –Non-structural measures
- 5. Capacity development




CYCLONE:

The coastal stretch of West Bengal is 157.5 kms. It is highly vulnerable to cyclone. The phenomenal storm surge in coastal West Bengal is due to its nature of coastal belt. The northern part of the Bay of Bengal is very shallow. The coast is also landlocked on three sides. As a result, when a very severe cyclonic storm approaches the coast, the enormous storm surge generated by the wind pressure submerges the coastal belt at the time of the storm crossing the belt. The frequency of storms crossing this belt is also high. Another peculiar characteristic of this coast is that it is crisscrossed by innumerable rivers and rivulets, with the elevation of the islands about 4 to 5 meters which helps a cyclonic system to collect moisture during its pass over land area, adding to the devastation for longer time.

West Bengal has seen a phenomenal increase in the number of cyclonic system and affecting its coastal areas in the last decade.

- ➤ Cyclone AILA of 25/05/2009, caused huge damage to the North 24 Pargans, South 24-Parganas, Purba Midnapur and Kolkata. Death tolled to 146.
- ➤ Cyclone Phailin of 12/10/2013. Caused Death of 23 persons in the District Purba Midnapur, Paschim Midnapur and Burdwan.
- > Cyclone Fani, of 04/05/2019 affected 16 districts of the state.
- Cyclone Bulbul of 05/11/2019 affected 7 Districts with 16 deaths.
- > Super Cyclone Amphan 20/05/2020 caused huge damage to the 16 districts of South Bengal killing 99 people.
- ➤ Very Severe Cyclone YAAS of 25/05/2021 affected 18 districts.

Minimizing the risk of life and economy can be achieved by a cooperated disaster management plan of all the line departments. The departments and agencies that play the major roles are:-

Department of Irrigation and Waterways, Public Works Department, Department of Agriculture, Department of Sundarban Affairs, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Department of North Bengal Development, Department of Urban Development and Municipal Affairs, Department of Tourism, Department of Power and Non-Conventional Source of Energy, Public Health Engineering, Department Industry Commerce and Enterprises, Department of Panchayat and Rural Development, Department of Fisheries, Department of School Education, Department of Higher Education, Department of Animal Resource Development, Department of Fire and Emergency Services, Department of Food and Supplies, District Administration & Police Administration.

The Department of Disaster Management and Civil Defence being the nodal agency for all kind of disaster scenarios in the state plays the vital role of coordination between all the line departments and agencies.

Prevention and Mitigation:

Training, Awareness Generation & Mock drills and Community-Based Disaster Management plays key role in disaster prevention and minimise its loss impact.

Administrative Training Institute, District Disaster Management Authority, ILGUS, Health Dept, Fire and Emergency Services and relevant institutions impart training to government officials for capacity building. The knowledge will be used for Community based Disaster Management.

FLOOD:

Flood is a temporary inundation of large regions as a result of an increase in reservoir or of rivers flooding their banks because of heavy rains, high winds, cyclones storm surge of and along the coastal area, tsunami, melting snow or dam bursts.

Types of Floods:

Flash floods: It is defined as floods which occur within six hours of the beginning of heavy rainfall, and are usually associated with cloud bursts, storms and cyclones requiring rapid localized warning and immediate response if damage is to be mitigated. In case of flash floods, warning for timely evacuation may not always be possible.

River floods: Such floods are caused by precipitation over large catchment's areas. These floods normally build up slowly or seasonally and may continue for days or weeks as compared to flash floods.

Coastal floods: Some floods are associated with the cyclonic activities like Hurricanes, tropical cyclone etc. Catastrophic flooding is often aggravated by wind-induced storm surges along the coast.

Urban Flood: Urban floods stem from a combination of various meteorological and hydrological extremes, such as extreme precipitation and flows in short spans of time or heavy rainfall followed by cyclonic storms. Thus, flooding in urban areas is caused by intense and/or prolonged rainfall, which overwhelms the capacity of the drainage system.

West Bengal has experienced regular flooding. Nearly all the districts experienced all of the above-mentioned categories of floods.

- ✓ 2015 Due to heavy rainfall caused by deep depression over northeast Bay of Bengal, 12 districts of West Bengal got affected by heavy flood.
- ✓ 2017 Due to heavy rainfall caused by deep depression over northeast Bay of Bengal, 20 districts of West Bengal got affected by heavy flood.
- ✓ 2021- Due to extremely heavy rainfall & excessive release of water from dams, barrages, & major weirs, 23 districts of West Bengal got affected by heavy flood.
- ✓ The recent years has seen nearly all types of flood and nearly all regions of the state. Namely Purba

Bardhaman, Hooghly, Howrah, Nadia, North and South 24 Parganas, East and West Medinipur, Malda, Murshidabad, Dakshin Dinajpur, Uttar Dinajpur, Jalpaiguri, Alipurduar, Coochbehar are more prone to River Flooding.

- Paschim Bardhaman, Birbhum, Bankura, Jhargram and parts of Purulia, Darjeeling, Kalimpong are prone to Flash flooding sometimes caused by cloudburst rains.
- Coastal Flooding are very common in Purba Medinipur, South 24 Parganas.
- ➤ Kolkata, the state capital is exposed to regular urban flooding, sometimes caused by rain and sometimes tidal waves. Cloud burst rains are also commonly seen in the recent years.

Vulnerability: The majority of population of the state is directly or indirectly affected by flooding. Flood causes maximum economic damage to the people. Nearly the entire state faces multiple floods every year. The geological and geomorphologic characteristics makes the state largely flood prone. The major tributaries and distributaries of Ganga & Brahmaputra river systems pass through this state. The state being in the lower course of these river systems experience spillage of water whenever the upper and the middle course of the rivers experience high intensity of rain. Important Dams and Barrages dots the western and the northern boundary of the state. The carrying capacity of the dams are changing with passage of time and thereby making the catchment areas regularly exposed to flood like situations.

FLASH FLOOD MANAGEMENT PLAN:

What is Flash Flood

Flash floods are characterized by very fast rise and recession of flow of small volume and high discharge, which causes high damages because of suddenness. This occurs in hilly regions and sloping lands where heavy rainfall and thunderstorms or cloudbursts are common (*Ref: NDMA Guidelines on Management of Flood*)

It is because the speed and quantity of inflow of water out pace drainage systems. Very heavy rainfall in hill tops results in sudden down flow of water at a high speed and may create havoc in habitations down below the hillock. Sometimes, this high speed water evades the traditional path and carries with it Mudflows, Debris flows and Rock falls. Such flows and floods hardly give any time for preparation. Flash floods submerge areas suddenly and remain for a short period of time. Yet its damaging potential is as high as that of the general floods. The most unpredictable aspect of this is that flash floods hardly give any time for preparation.

In the past few years, the occurrence of natural disaster like flash floods has increased in India. This can be attributed to climate change. For instance, the 2018 Kerala floods, 2013 Uttarakhand floods, 2021 Maharashtra floods, 2017 Gujarat flood and many other.

Causes of flash floods

A flash flood is often the result of a heavy or excessive rainfall. Whenever it rains, the soil acts as an absorber, and absorbs the precipitation. However, in cases of heavy rain, the soil may be saturated to capacity and unable to absorb any more water.

Flooding can also occur after a drought, when the soil is too dry and hardened to absorb the precipitation. This is why, flash floods are a common scene in desert landscapes after heavy rain falls.

The other reason of flash floods is cloudburst or thunderstorm. It is common in places such as hilly regions and sloping lands.

Depression and cyclonic storms in the coastal areas of Orissa, West Bengal, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, and Tamil Nadu also cause flash floods.

Further, the states of Arunachal Pradesh, Assam, Orissa, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, the Western Ghats in Maharashtra and Kerala are more vulnerable to flash floods caused by cloud bursts.

In addition to these, sudden release of waters from upstream reservoirs, breaches in dams created by earthquake/landslides and embankments on the banks of the rivers can also lead to disastrous floods. The severe floods in Himachal Pradesh in August 2000 and June 2005, and in Arunachal Pradesh in 2000 are a few examples of flash floods caused by breaches in dams created by earthquake/landslides.

Increase in number of occurrence

According to the 'Climate change and India: A 4X4 assessment a sectoral and regional analysis for 2030s floods report', temperature rise in India would increase the frequency of flood events in India during the end

of the 21st century (2071-2100). Further, the Himalayan belt is also projected to witness a significant rise in temperature up to 2.6 degrees Celsius. By the 2030s, the intensity is expected to increase by 2-12%.

The report further stated that the temperature rise will result in multiplication of flash flood incidents leading to extensive landslides, which would bring extreme damage to the agricultural area thereby threatening the food security of the country.

Area Prone to Flash Flood

The Ministry of Water Resources (MOWR) and the state governments/SDMAs/DDMAs concerned will urgently undertake identification of areas prone to floods along with names of villages/talukas or tehsils/districts in a scientific manner in collaboration with the NRSA and Survey of India(SOI). Darjeeling, Kalimpong, Alipurduar, Jalpaiguri are more vulnerable to flash floods caused by cloud bursts. Heavy or excessive rainfall in Sikkim and Bhutan often causes flash flood in Balason, Mal, Ghis, Jayanti rivers in northern part of west Bengal.

Damages Caused by Flash Flood

More than the loss of life and damage to property, the sense of insecurity and fear in the minds of people living in the flood prone areas is a cause of great concern. The after effects of flash floods such as the agony of survivors, non availability of drinking water, essential commodities and medicines, loss of the dwellings etc. make flash floods the most feared among the natural disasters.

In 2020, flash flood occurred at Rakti and Balason rivers and in 2021 at Balason river causes bridge damages in Darjeeling District.

Preventive Measure

Incidents of high intensity rainfall over short durations, which cause flash floods, are on the rise and the problem needs to be tackled in a scientific manner.

Flash floods are dangerous as its occurrences are sudden with less time to respond. It is advisable to listen to weather bulletins to avoid visiting places with chances of a flash flood.


Central Water Commission (CWC)/ National Remote Sensing Agency (NRSA)/ state governments/ SDMAs also check for landslides and blockages in rivers with the help of satellite imageries. In case of their occurrence, warning systems are set up to reduce losses. It is also advised to take appropriate structural measures to eliminate the damage in case of sudden collapse of the blockages.

Furthermore, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) has been using Doppler radars, a flash floods forecasting and warning systems to predict the occurrence of flash floods.

In West Bengal a system of control rooms has been established in hills of North Bengal to inform downstream regions of sudden heavy rains and issue alert for flash floods. The system would be helpful for Dooars region and tea gardens of North Bengal.

Following measures to be adopted to minimise the loss due to flooding are:

- Improvement of design for irrigation and flood protective structures
- Construction of dams, Desiltation of existing dams, construction of flood protection wall, flood diverting channels etc.
- Strengthening/repair of existing roads and bridges and other critical infrastructure in flood plains.
- > Strengthening of dams and canals.
- Development of catchment area of the flood plain
- Afforestation

Capacity Building and Awareness Programmes will make the mitigation system and the people better prepared for flood situations.

- > Imparting training to the stakeholders involved in flood mitigation and management.
- > Provide professional training about disaster resistance construction to engineers and architects.
- Provide training to masons.
- > Encourage soil and material testing in laboratories

Interagency coordination is the baseline of all modelling for flood preparedness and better mitigation measures. The responsible agencies are:-

EARTHQUAKE:

Seismic Profile of West Bengal:

The seismic zonation map (2002) as prepared by Bureau of Indian Standard shows Eastern section of northern districts of Jalpaiguri and Coochbehar lie in Zone –V .The remaining part of these two districts, along with the districts of Darjeeling, Kalimpong, Uttar Dinajpur, Dakshin Dinajpur, Malda, 24 Paraganas (south & north) lie in Zone – IV.

The rest of the state along with Kolkata lies in Zone – III expect some portions of Purulia, Bankura and Paschim Medinipur. Small part of Purulia, Bankura and Jhargram lies in Zone – II.

It is also found from seismic map that two major fault lines run through the state namely the Pingla Fault running through the South Bengal districts and the Malda Kishangunj Fault running through the North Bengal districts.

Several key factors that contribute vulnerability of human populations to earthquakes are location of settlements in an earthquake prone area, especially on soft ground, on area prone to landslides or along fault lines dense collection of weak buildings with high occupancy. Non-engineered building constructed by earth, rubble, buildings with heavy roofs (more vulnerable than light weight structures), poor quality and maintenance of buildings Weak or flexible storey intending for parking purposes.




- To provide or make available seismic micro zonation to all districts.
- Provide vulnerability and risk assessment map to districts and departments.
- Departmental earthquake contingency plan.
- Ensure earthquake related departmental action plan and SOP.

The agencies those who are to be ready and prepared to mitigate earthquake are:-Department of Irrigation and Waterways, Public Works Department, Department of Sundarban Affairs, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Department of North Bengal Development, Department of Urban Development and Municipal Affairs, Department of Tourism, Department of Power and Non-Conventional Source of Energy, Public Health Engineering, Department Industry Commerce and Enterprises, Department of Panchayat and Rural Development, Department of Fisheries, Department of School Education, Department of Higher Education, Department of Animal Resource Development, Department of Fire and Emergency Services, Department of Food and Supplies, District Administration & Police Administration.ATI/SIPRD/ILGUS imparts training on earthquake preparedness.

LANDSLIDE:

Landslides -These are slippery masses of rock, earth or debris which move by force of their own weight down mountain slopes or river banks. Landslides are common disaster phenomena in Darjeeling & Kalimpong districts of West Bengal.

The landslide hazard in West Bengal has been observed mostly in the hilly terrains of Darjeeling & Kalimpong Districts. Urbanization, especially in the hilly terrains, involving construction activities often causes perturbations in the hill slopes triggering landslides.



The agencies those who are in line to prepare and mitigate landslides are:-

Public Works Department, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Department of North Bengal Development, Department of Urban Development and Municipal Affairs, Department of Tourism, Public Health Engineering, Department of Panchayat and Rural Development, Department of School Education, Department of Higher Education, Department of Fire and Emergency Services, Department of Food and Supplies, District Administration & Police Administration.

COLD WAVE ACTION PLAN:

A cold wave is a meteorological event generally characterised by i)sharp drop of air temperature near the surface, leading to extremely low values; ii) steep rise of pressure; iii) strengthening of wind speed; iv) associated with hazardous weather like frost and icing. Cold wave, heavy snowfall/rainfall, fog, snowstorms etc. have emerged as major weather hazards. It can affect adversely on environment, agriculture, health, livestock, livelihoods, socio-economy, and other allied sectors. The extent of damage caused by a cold wave depends on the temperature, length of exposure, humidity levels, and the wind speed.

Impact of Cold Wave in West Bengal: Cold wave is a localised seasonal phenomenon. As only a very small part of the Himalayas runs through the northern parts of West Bengal, the occurrence of Cold Wave is very rare in this state. Although, the northern parts of West Bengal, specially the hilly regions (Darjeeling, Kalimpong) and Western Districts (Purulia, Paschim Bardhaman, Bankura, Birbhum and Jhargram) and the adjoining plains are influenced by transient disturbances in the mid latitude westerlies which often have weak frontal characteristics. As per the information shared by Regional Meteorological Centre, Kolkata, these districts faced following few days of cold waves for the last four years:

Hence an Action plan on Cold wave has been framed for immediate and longer-term actions to increase preparedness, information sharing and response coordination to reduce the impacts on vulnerable populations. The NDMA guideline for Preparation of Action Plan- Prevention & Management of Cold Wave & Frost has been shared with all the Districts of the State.

Hazard Analysis -Due to West Bengal's vast geographical area, Cold waves are prominent in the northern part of the State, alongwith adjoining area. In the current climate change regime, these weather-related events (like cold waves) are further aggravated.

Vulnerability Analysis- The impact of hazard events such as cold waves, extreme cold waves, rainfall, snowfall, is substantial and represents an increasing threat over West Bengal. The extent of vulnerability (mild, moderate or intensive) and the probable estimate of damages to agriculture including animal husbandry due to cold wave is defined the vulnerability of cold wave. Cold waves may also impact the efficiency and operation of other

infrastructure like, Energy/(Power), IT/(Communications), Transportation, Banking & Finance, Government Services, Emergency Services, Water Supply/Management, Food production/security, etc.

Risk Analysis- Risk assessment includes an evaluation of all elements that are relevant to the understanding of the existing hazards and their effects on a specific environment. Special care has been taken to prevent fire accidents caused by heating pots within homes.

Early Warning and Communication: IMD issues forecasts & warnings for all weather related hazards including Agro-met advisory for farmers at local level in short to medium range (valid for the next five days) every day as a part of its multi-hazard early warning system. The warnings received from IMD are transmitted to the concerned district authority as well as up to block offices and in some cases to the concerned district authority through whatsapp system regulated at the SEOC.

Do's and Don'ts in Cold Wave:

Do's

Before

- Listen to the radio; watch TV, read newspapers for local weather forecast to know if a cold wave is round the corner
- Do stock adequate winter clothing. Multiple layers of clothing are more helpful.
- Keep emergency supplies ready.
- An increased likelihood of various illnesses like flu, running/ stuffy nose or nosebleed, which usually set in or get aggravated due to prolonged exposure to cold. Consult the doctor for symptoms like these.

During

- Follow weather information and emergency procedure information closely and act as advised.
- Stay indoors as much as possible and minimize travel to prevent exposure to cold wind.
- Wear multiple layers of loose fitting, lightweight, windproof warm woolen clothing, rather than one layer of heavy clothing. Tight clothing reduces blood circulation.
- Keep yourself dry. If wet, then cover your head, neck, hands and toes adequately as the majority of heat loss occurs through these body parts.
- Prefer mittens over gloves. Mittens provide more warmth and insulation from cold, as fingers share their warmth and expose less surface area to the cold.
- Use hats and mufflers to prevent heat loss, Wear insulated / waterproof shoes.
- Eat healthy food to maintain the equilibrium of body temperature
- Drink hot fluids regularly, as this will maintain body heat to fight cold.
- Take care of elderly people and children and check on neighbours who live alone, especially the elderly about their well-being.
- Do store essential supply as per requirement. Store adequate water as pipes may freeze.
- Follow the guide on heat insulation for non-industrial buildings and take necessary preparedness measures.
- Watch out for symptoms of frostbite like numbness, white or pale appearance on fingers, toes, earlobes and the tip of the nose, while exposed to cold waves.
- Treat the areas affected by frostbite in warm (not hot) water (the temperature should be comfortable to touch for unaffected parts of the body).
- Do not ignore shivering. It is an important first sign that the body is losing heat and is a signal to return indoors quickly.
- Seek medical attention as soon as possible for someone suffering from Frostbite/Hypothermia.
- Move pet-animals indoors. Likewise, protect livestock or domestic animals from cold weather by moving them inside.

- Severe exposure to cold wave can lead to Hypothermia a decrease in body temperature that can cause shivering, difficulty in speaking, sleepiness, stiff muscles, heavy breathing, weakness, and/or loss of consciousness. Hypothermia is a medical emergency that needs immediate medical attention.
- Consult doctor for symptoms like various illnesses, running/stuffy nose particularly during the period of COVID -19.

In the case of hypothermia

- · Get the person into a warm place and change clothes.
- Warm the person's body with skin-to-skin contact, dry layers of blankets, clothes, towels, or sheets.
- Give warm drinks to help increase body temperature. Do not give alcohol.
- · Seek medical attention if the condition worsens.

Don'ts

- · Avoid prolonged exposure to cold,
- Don't drink alcohol. It reduces your body temperature; it actually narrows your blood vessels, particularly those in the hands, which can increase the risk of hypothermia.
- Do not massage the frostbitten area. This can cause more damage. Do not give the affected person any fluids unless fully alert.

HEATWAVE ACTION PLAN:

Heat wave is a condition of atmospheric temperature that leads to physiological stress, which sometimes can claim human life. Heat wave is defined as the condition where maximum temperature at a grid point is 3°C or more than the normal temperature, consecutively for 3 days or more. World Meteorological Organization defines a heat wave as five or more consecutive days during which the daily maximum temperature exceeds the average maximum temperature by five degrees Celsius. If the maximum temperature of any place continues to be more than 45° C consecutively for two days, it is called a heat wave condition.

As the state of West Bengal is situated in the arch bend of Bay of Bengal, the weather condition of this state is moderate that is neither very hot nor too cold. Close proximity to sea helps in regular moisture inclusion in the wind, thus resist the hot air blowing from northern part of India often prevents creating Heat wave like condition in the state. However, since 2010, records of increased temperature from the normal have been observed in regularity. Hence, the Heat Wave Action Plan has been framed for immediate and longer-term actions to increase preparedness, information sharing and response coordination to reduce the health impacts of extreme heat on vulnerable populations. The NDMA guideline for Preparation of Action Plan- Prevention & Management of Heat Wave has been shared with all the Districts of the State.

Heat wave in West Bengal: West Bengal has 6 districts (Purulia, Bankura, Birbhum, Paschim Medinipur, Jhargram & Paschim Bardhaman) which are prone to heat wave like conditions. These districts are situated in western parts of West Bengal and are geographically adjacent with the Chotanagpur plateau area. Chotanagpur plateau region is located away from coastal areas. This makes the region very dry and prone to high temperature during the summer months.

As per the AGROMET Advisory Bulletin for the State of West Bengal and Andaman Islands for the period from 21st May to 25th May, 2022 by RMC, Kolkata, the distribution of minimum and maximum temperature in the month of May, 2022 is written in the table below:

Forecast and Issuance of Heat Alert: India Meteorological Department (IMD) is mandated to meteorological observations and provides current and forecast meteorological information for optimum operation of weather-sensitive activities. It provides warning against severe weather phenomena like tropical cyclones, dust storms, heavy rains and snow, cold and heat waves etc. It also provides real time data and weather prediction of maximum temperature, Heat wave warning, Heat-alert for the vulnerable cities/rural area of the severity and frequency.

Prevention, Preparedness and Mitigation Measures: Prevention, preparedness and mitigation measures for various stakeholders are enumerated in the following table:

Do's and Dont's: Heat Wave conditions can result in physiological strain, which could even result in death. To minimize the impact during the heat wave and to prevent serious ailment or death because of heat stroke, the following measures are useful:

DO'S:

- Listen to Radio, watch TV, read News paper for local weather forecast to know if a heat wave is on the way
- Drink sufficient water and as often as possible, even if not thirsty
- Wear lightweight, light-coloured, loose, and porous cotton clothes. Use protective goggles, umbrella/hat, shoes or chappals while going out in sun.
- While travelling, carry water with you.
- If you work outside, use a hat or an umbrella and also use a damp cloth on your head, neck, face and limbs.
- Use ORS, homemade drinks like lassi, torani (rice water), lemon water, buttermilk, etc. which help to rehydrate the body.
- Recognize the signs of heat stroke, heat rash or heat cramps such as weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea, sweating and seizures. If you feel faint or ill, see a doctor immediately.
- Keep animals in shade and give them plenty of water to drink.
- Keep your home cool, use curtains, shutters or sunshade and open windows at night.
- Use fans, damp clothing and take bath in cold water frequently.
- · Provide cool drinking water near work place.
- Caution workers to avoid direct sunlight.
- · Schedule strenuous jobs to cooler times of the day.
- Increasing the frequency and length of rest breaks for outdoor activities.
- Pregnant workers and workers with a medical condition should be given additional attention.

DONT'S:

- Do not leave children or pets in parked vehicles.
- Avoid going out in the sun, especially between 12.00 noon and 3.00 p.m.
- Avoid wearing dark, heavy or tight clothing.
- Avoid strenuous activities when the outside temperature is high. Avoid working outside between 12 noon and 3 p.m.
- Avoid cooking during peak hours. Open doors and windows to ventilate cooking area adequately.
- Avoid alcohol, tea, coffee and carbonated soft drinks, which dehydrates the body.
- Avoid high-protein food and do not eat stale food.

INDUSTRIAL (CHEMICAL) HAZARD:

Industrial hazards are an increasing source of risk to their people and its environment. This is an effect of globalization of production, an increase of industrialization and a certain level of risk of accidents connected with production, process, transportation and waste management. These risks are associated with the increase of substances in accident condition or with the production of such substances under certain conditions such as fire.

The districts of Howrah, Hoogly, South and North 24 Parganas, Purba Medinipur, Paschim Bardhaman are highly vulnerable to industrial hazards as these districts are dotted with industrial belts and units. Industries attract population and the density increases the vulnerability of the zone. Better preparedness will help lowering the vulnerability. District specific plan to drawn up and mock exercises would be conducted to enhance the capacity of the disaster mangers & community as a whole and lowering disaster risks. The following activities are planned to reduce industrial (chemical) disaster risk.

- Undertake HRVA as part of preparing and periodic revision of DM plans of line departments, districts and industries.
- Follow-up on-site and off-site disaster management plans of industries and organizing drills following plans.

- Ensuring water storage facilities and sources of water for accident containment and firefighting operations.
- Resource mapping to make use of the combined resources of the plant and the outside services to reduce loss of life & property in collaboration with Districts
- Identification & tie-up with hospitals & clinics for emergency treatment and arrangement for ambulance, oxygen and medicines etc.
- Organizing Awareness camps &training and district level mock drills
- Monitoring change in vulnerability and risk under changing scenario.
- Identification & tagging of shelters with basic facilities like drinking water and first aid for chemical exposure.
- Mapping of wide roads and multiple routes in the industrial area to allow quick access by first responders and to ensure escape pathways.
- Review rules to grant compensation to chemical accident victims
- Monitoring of safety audits and enforcement of disaster prevention norms.
- Empowering women, marginalized, and persons with disabilities to cope with industrial (Chemical) disasters
- Emergency communication and coordination with line agencies / departments be established.
- Community-Based Disaster Management initiative.

The departments that are responsible to prepare and mitigate the Industrial hazards are:-

Department Industry Commerce and Enterprises, Public Works Department, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Department of Urban Development and Municipal Affairs, Department of Power and Non-Conventional Source of Energy, Public Health Engineering, Department of Panchayat and Rural Development, Department of Animal Resource Development, Department of Fire and Emergency Services, Department of Food and Supplies, District Administration & Police Administration, State Pollution Control Board.



DROUGHT Management Plan

For Drought, nodal department would be Agriculture department. This department will work in co ordination with IMD and Irrigation & Waterways department. The detailed plan of drought is to be prepared by Agriculture department.

What is drought?

As per Manual for Drought Management developed by Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India, Drought is a temporary aberration, unlike aridity or even seasonal aridity (in terms of a well defined dry season), which is a permanent feature of climate. Drought in contrast is a recurrent, yet sporadic feature of climate, known to occur under all climatic regimes and is usually characterized by variability in terms of its spatial expanse, severity and duration.

Traditional way of determining Drought: The Government of India revised its norms in 2015 to lower the eligibility threshold from 50% loss to 33% loss to sown crops on account of drought to qualify for relief assistance. It was, however, noticed that some States still continue to recognise a minimum loss/ damage of 50% to sown crops (i.e, annewari /paisewari/ girdawari less than 50%) for the declaration of an area as drought affected.

Modern way of determining Drought: Five categories of indices are recommended for developing a monitoring matrix for drought. Rainfall is considered to be the most important indicator and therefore related meteorological data should be mandatorily considered in making any assessment of drought. The major indices are:

- 1. Rainfall Related Indices
 - A) Rainfall deviations, B) Dry Spell and C) Standard Precipitation Index
- 2. Remote Sensing based Vegetation Indices
- 3. Crop Situation Related Indices
 - A) Area under Sowing, B) Soil Moisture Based Indices
- 4. Hydrological Indices
- 5. Other Factors

The State Governments will declare drought through a notification specifying clearly the geographical extent and administrative units such as Gram Panchayats, Blocks, Sub-Divisions and Districts. Such notification will also indicate the level of intensity of the drought (moderate or severe). The validity of such notification will not be for more than 6 months unless de-notified earlier.

Elements at risk: Drought impacts mostly rain fed crops to start with and subsequently the irrigated crops. Areas with minimum of alternative water sources to rainfall (ground and canal water supplies), areas subjected to drastic environmental degradation such as denuded forest lands and altered ecosystems, and areas where livelihoods alternative to agriculture are least developed are most vulnerable to drought. The herdsman, landless labourers, subsistence farmers, the women, children, and farm animals are the most vulnerable groups affected by the drought conditions.

Typical Effects: Drought, different from other natural disasters, do not cause any structural damages. The typical effects include loss of crop, dairy, timber (forest fires), and fishery production; increase in energy demand for pumping water; reduced energy production; increased unemployment, loss of biodiversity, reduced water, air and landscape quality; groundwater depletion, food shortage, health reduction and loss of life, increased poverty, reduced quality of life, and social unrest leading to migration.

Districts with Lesser Rainfall in West Bengal: The districts of Bankura, Purulia, Birbhum and parts of Paschim Midnapore have been affected by deficient rainfall and adverse soil conditions.

As Per Agriculture department, Government of West Bengal, Precautionary measures to be followed to overcome the adverse effects of Drought:-

To make preparedness effective at the grass root level, a joint monitoring of ground situation in the month of May, by the District level officers of Department of Agriculture, Irrigation and Waterways and WRI&D are to be made to find out the irrigation water availability from all Major, Medium and Minor Irrigation sources of that particular district, quantifying it at the block level, documenting the entire report and finally fortnight monitoring of the situation.

During Early season Drought (June to 1st week of July) the following actions to be taken:-

- i) To harvest the runoff water, more number of surface water harvesting structures like pond, dug well etc. are to be excavated and as the land areas of terai zone are having good slope, the models like constructing dug well/water harvesting structures at lower elevation of the slope and pumping water from the well to give sustainable irrigation during drought can be explored.
- ii) Construction of earthen bunds around the individual plot to harvest runoff water.
- iii) Compulsory application of organic manure at recommended doses to improve the water holding capacity of the soil to combat adverse effects of drought in a better way.
- iv) Preparation of Community Seedbed of rice seedlings near common source of water body i.e. pond, dug well etc. and earmark at least 10 % area under each block at least a month before normal seedbed preparation of rice, suitable for this community seedbed.

- v) Staggered sowing of rice seed in seedbed at 10 days interval.
- vi) Double transplanting of medium to long duration rice varieties to avoid the drought time in the main field.
- vii) Application of 50% Nitrogen as basal dose and closer spacing with higher number of seedlings per hill are to be practiced.
- viii) Direct seeding of rice through Zero/Minimal Tillage machine as per recommendation.
- ix) In upland areas cultivation of arhar, black gram, groundnut and maize and mixed crop of maize and arhar are the better crop options

• During Late season Drought (August) the following actions to be taken:-

- i) To harvest the runoff water, more number of surface water harvesting structures like pond, dug well etc. are to be excavated and as the land areas of terai zone are having good slope, the models like constructing dug well/water harvesting structures at lower elevation of the slope and pumping water from the well to give sustainable irrigation during drought can be explored.
- ii) Construction of earthen bunds around the individual plot to harvest runoff water.
- iii) Compulsory application of organic manure at recommended doses to improve the water holding capacity of the soil to combat adverse effects of drought in a better way.
- iv) Double transplanting of medium to long duration rice varieties to avoid the drought time in the main field.
- v) It is recommended to practice mechanical weeding in rice field under this situation and use the uprooted biomass of weeds as soil mulch or use other mulching materials like straw in the rice field to conserve soil moisture. Not only that, due to soil pulverization through mechanical weeding, the soil capillary tubes are broken resulting in further reduction of evaporation loss of soil moisture coming from the ground water through capillary rise.
- vi) It is also recommended not to apply nitrogenous fertilizers in the soil during this dry period to avoid the higher growth of weeds. However, depending upon the crop growth, foliar spray of either DAP or Urea @ 1-2% may be applied at the critical growth stages of the crop, to combat the adverse weather condition.

In case of Drought during part or the whole period of Kharif season advisory may be given to the farmers through monitoring of situation involving block/sub-division and district level Agricultural Officers in the following suggestive line.

In this State there are several State Plan Scheme like, Distribution of improved, high-yielding and hybrid seeds of different crops through Minikits, subsidized sale of quality seeds etc. to take up relief measures through distribution of paddy seeds, distribution of Minikits of different crops to the small and marginal farmers as well as distribution of different seeds specially paddy and wheat on subsidized rate in addition to the relief measures which are to be taken up out of the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF).

The State Govt. has taken the production programme of quality seeds of different crops considering the requirement of seed in the State.

CHAPTER 5

Early Warning, Preparedness, Prevention and Mitigation

Early Warning and Dissemination System:

In most disaster situations, the experience has shown that loss of life and property could be significantly reduced because of preparedness measures and appropriate warning systems. The importance of warning systems therefore hardly needs any emphasis. Indiscriminate warnings may result in non-responsiveness of the people. It is therefore necessary that in every disaster a responsible officer is designated to issue the warnings. Alert/Warning indicates the onset of a disaster for which a warning system is essential. This system may range from alarms (e.g., for fires), sirens (e.g., for industrial accidents) to public announcements through radio, television etc. (e.g., for cyclones, floods). Other traditional modes of communication (e.g. beating of drums, ringing of bells, hoisting of flags) are also used in inaccessible areas.

The warnings received from IMD and other early warning disseminating agencies are transmitted to the concerned district authority as well as up to block offices and in some cases to the concerned vulnerable group through a sms based system regulated at the SEOC.

Dissemination of Warning:

- Communities in disaster prone areas are made aware of the warning.
- All warning systems and technologies are maintained in working condition and checked regularly.
- Alternate warning systems must be kept in readiness in case of technical failure (e.g., power failure).
- Only the designated agencies/officers will issue the warning.
- · All available warning systems should be kept ready.
- The warning should to the extent possible be clear about the severity, the time frame, area that may be affected.
- Warning statements should be conveyed in a simple, direct and non-technical language, and incorporate day-to-day usage patterns.
- The do's and don'ts should be clearly communicated to the community to ensure an appropriate responses.
- Warning statements should not evoke curiosity or panic behaviour. This should be in a professional language devoid of emotions.
- Effective media management and rumor control mechanisms should be activated.
- All relevant agencies and organizations should be alerted.
- Wherever possible, assistance of community leaders and organized groups should be sought in explaining the threat.
- Once a warning is issued, it should be followed-up by subsequent warnings in order to keep the people informed of the latest situations.
- When the disaster threat tiding away, an all-clear signal must be given.

PREPAREDNESS MEASURES:

Preparedness involves activities undertaken in advance of an emergency to develop and enhance Operational capacity to respond and recover from an emergency. As part of a comprehensive preparedness program, there should be established - plans and procedures, prevention programs, resource management system, MoU / agreements with service providers (PPP), training awareness programs.

Preparedness Planning:

Planning is the one of the key elements in the Preparedness cycle. Preparedness cycle illustrates the way the plans are continuously evaluated and improved through a cycle of planning, organizing, training, equipping, exercising, evaluating and taking corrective action.

The state government and its departments assigned emergency responsibilities in this plan will prepare appropriate supporting plans and related standard operating procedures that describe how emergency operations will be carried out with the help of following plan:-

- District Disaster Management Plan;
- Hazard Specific Plan;
- PPP Model, MoU etc.

Recovery Plan:

District authority and other agencies are encouraged to develop recovery plans prior to the occurrence of a disaster. Such a plan should establish mechanisms for recovery decision-making and identify key participants in the recovery organization, including non-governmental and private sector entities. The plan should also identify processes and procedures for requesting state and central recovery assistance and ensuring that recovery activities are carried out in accordance with the requirements of these programs.

Durga Puja, Kalipuja, Eid & Ganga Sagar Mela are the major annual festival in the state where millions of people participate and celebrate those events. West Bengal Police and Kolkata Police in collaboration with respect districts use to prepare combine offsite and onsite crowd management plan as per the guide lines provided by the WBSDMA. Accordingly, EOC monitors the entire situation during the festivals on 24x7 basis

and these crowd management plans are successfully implemented in tandem with SOPs as well. This disaster management plan is used by the respective authority and updated on regular basis.

Preparedness Training & Capacity Building:

Training, tests and exercises are essential to ensure Government officials, emergency response personnel and the public are operationally ready. As part of the emergency management training curriculum, it is recommended that personnel with emergency responsibilities complete emergency management courses as prescribed from time-to-time by the National / State Authority.

Training program should include all stakeholders including community, all frontline workers, civil defence, home guard, NSS, NCC, NYK, Schools and colleges, Civil society, CBOs, corporate entities, SDRF, Fire brigade.

Prevention and Mitigation:

Prevention consists of actions that reduce risk from natural or human made disaster incidents. List and elaborate all types of measures (like - building codes, floodplain management, storm water management, coastal area zoning and management plan etc.) planned and implemented by the States as a part of prevention measures.

It is good to have long term mitigation goals in place and connect these goals with measures that State has planned and implemented. These goals may include (but not limited to)

Provide better early warning methods for flood, storms, cyclone to reduce the destruction and loss of life
Provide for safer environments for transportation systems
Eliminate flooding in populated areas
Ensure redundant water supply systems
Reduce effects of the natural environment on the infrastructure Ensure redundant power systems or critical facilities
Ensure adequate materials available for road maintenance

Protection reduces or eliminates a threat to people, property, and the environment. Primarily focused on adversarial incidents, the protection of Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources (CIKR) is vital to local States, national security, public health & safety and economic vitality. Protection includes actions or measures taken to cover or shield assets from exposure, injury or destruction. Protective actions may occur before, during or after an incident and prevent, minimize or contain the impact of an incident.

Mitigation with its focus on the impact of a hazard encompasses the structural and non-structural approaches taken to eliminate or limit a hazard's exposure; impact on people, property and the environment.

Common structural measures for disaster risk reduction include dams, flood wall / levies, ocean wave barriers, earthquake-resistant construction, and evacuation shelters.

Common non-structural measures include building codes, land use planning laws and their enforcement, research and assessment, information resources, and public awareness programmes. Note that in civil and structural engineering, the term "structural" is used in a more restricted sense to mean just the load bearing structure, with other parts such as wall cladding and interior fittings being termed non-structural.

Examples of mitigation activities include:-

- Town Planning Act: Planning, adopting and enforcing stringent building codes, flood-proofing requirements, seismic design standards and cyclone wind-bracing requirements for new construction or repairing existing buildings.
- Zoning Regulations: Planning and adopting zoning ordinances that steer development away from
 areas subject to flooding, storm surge or coastal erosion. Development Control Regulations: Incorporate
 the disaster management concerns into development. This should include all Government Sponsored
 Developmental Programs and Schemes.
- Undertaking retrofitting work on public buildings to withstand ground shaking or cyclone- strength winds.
- Land use regulation: Planning and building community shelters and tornado safe rooms to help protect people in their homes, public buildings and schools in hurricane and tornado-prone areas.

- Safety norms for economic and social infrastructures including places of worships and crowd management: Steps taken for developing and implementing public safety norms for critical infrastructures and places of worships.
- Capacity Building for Mitigation: Steps taken for human resource development and capacity building for effective disaster mitigation at State Level.
- Awareness generation on disaster mitigation.
- Mainstreaming DRR in all developmental projects.

Natural Disasters

The State follows all-hazard approach for disaster prevention and mitigation is multi- hazard approach due to its vulnerable to all-major natural hazards such as Drought, Flood, Cyclone, Storm Surge, Earthquake, Tsunami, Landslides etc.

Human Made Disasters

Manmade disasters are unpredictable and can spread across geographical boundaries. Some disasters in this class are entirely manmade while other may occur because of natural disasters, equipment failures, or workers having inadequate training or fatigue and make errors.

Technological disasters include a broad range of incidents. Routes of exposure through water and food, airborne releases, fires and explosions, and hazardous materials or waste (e.g., chemical, biological, or radioactive) released into the environment from a fixed facility or during transport.

Fires, explosions, building or bridge collapses, transportation crashes, dam or levee failures, nuclear reactor accidents, and breaks in water, gas, or sewer lines are other examples of technological disasters.

CHAPTER 6

Response Mechanism

Response Strategy:

During the Response Phase, emergency managers set goals, prioritise actions and chalk out operational strategies. This plan provides a broad overview of these goals, priorities, strategies and describes what should occur during each step, when and at which direction.

Section 22(2), 24, 30 and 34 of DM Act 2005 has clearly laid down various duties relating to Disaster Management to be performed by various agencies. No single agency or department can handle a disaster situation of any scale alone. Different departments have to work together to manage the disaster. For proper coordination and effective use of all available resources, the different departments and agencies need a formalized response management structure that lends consistency, fosters efficiency and provides appropriate direction during response. Response Management constitutes the functions of planning, execution and coordination. Planning in the pre-disaster phase is the responsibility of various authorities created under the DM Act, while the execution of the plans has to be carried out by various line departments of the Government and by existing administrative structure in the State as well as in Districts.

Operational Goals:

During the response phase, the agencies that are charged with responsibilities in this plan should focus on the following goals:

- Mitigate Hazards.
- Meet Basic Human Needs.
- · Address Needs of People with Disabilities and Older Adults.
- Restore Essential Services.
- Support Community and Economic Recovery

Operational Priorities:

Operational priorities govern resource allocation and the response strategies for the State and its political subdivisions during an emergency. Below are operational priorities addressed in this plan:

- Save Lives The preservation of life is the top priority of emergency managers and first responders and takes precedence over all other considerations.
- Protect Health and Safety Measures should be taken to mitigate the emergency's impact on public health and safety.
- Protect Property All feasible efforts must be made to protect public and private property and resources, including critical infrastructure, from damage during and after an emergency.
- Preserve the Environment All possible efforts must be made to preserve environment and protect it from damage during an emergency.

Response Structure and Organization:

Incident Response System (IRS) is a system of Management by Objectives through IAP (Incident Action Plan). It takes care of any expanding incident through an organizational structure of Command Staff, Sections, Branches, Divisions, Groups, Units, resources and span of control. Through Unified Command (UC) it allows all agencies having jurisdictional or functional responsibilities to jointly develop incident objectives and strategies.

IRS requires that every emergency response involving multiple area or multiple agencies include the four functions.

Command/Management: Command is responsible for the directing, ordering, and/or controlling of resources at the field response level. Management is responsible for overall emergency policy and coordination at the IRS EOC levels.

Command: A key concept in all emergency planning is to establish command and tactical control at the lowest level that can perform that role effectively in the organization. Management: The EOC serves as a central location from which multiple agencies or organizations coordinate information collection and evaluation, priority setting and resource management.


Operations: Responsible for coordinating and supporting operations in support of the response to the emergency through implementation of the organizational level's Action Plans (AP). At the Field Level, the Operations Section is responsible for the coordinated tactical response directly applicable to, or in support of the objectives in accordance with the Incident Action Plan (IAP). In the EOC, the Operations Section Coordinator manages functional coordinators who share information and decisions about discipline-specific operations.

Planning: Planning/Intelligence also maintains information on the current and forecasted situation and on the status of resources assigned to the emergency or the EOC. As needed, Unit Coordinators are appointed to collect and analyze data, prepare situation reports, develop action plans, set Geographic Information Systems (GIS) priorities, compile and maintain documentation, conduct advance planning, manage technical specialists and coordinate demobilization.

Logistics: Responsible for providing facilities, services, personnel, equipment and materials in support of the emergency. Unified ordering takes place through the Logistics Section Ordering Managers to ensure controls and accountability over resource requests. As needed, Unit Coordinators are appointed to address the needs for communications, food, medical, supplies, facilities and ground support.

Incident Response Team (IRT):


The IRS envisages and lays down various tasks that may need to be performed by the existing administrative machinery at various levels. It also recommends prior identification of officers for the performance of different tasks and getting them trained in their respective roles, provides a structure under which all the line departments will function in tandem with the District and State administration. The IRT will be pre designed at all level. On receipt of the early warning the RO may activate them. In case of occurrence of disaster without any warning, the local IRTs will respond and report to RO and request further support, if required.




IRS management functions are:

Responsible Officer (RO)	The RO is responsible for overall supervision, support and management of disaster response.
Command	The Incident Commander is responsible for management of response activity in his/ her jurisdiction.
Operations	The Operations Section is responsible for directing the tactical actions to meet incident objectives as per Incident Action Plan.
Planning	The Planning Section is responsible for the collection, evaluation, and display of incident information, maintaining status of resources, and preparing the Incident Action Plan and incident – related documentation.
Logistics	The Logistics Section is responsible for providing adequate services and support to meet all incident or event needs as per Incident Action Plan (IAP). Apart from Support & Service branches, Finance is also a branch in Logistics. The Finance Branch is responsible for keeping track of incident -related costs, personnel and equipment records, administering procurement contracts associated with the disaster or event and expedite the release of Ex-gratia payment.

State Level IRT: The state level of IRT prioritizes tasks and coordinates state resources in response to the requests from the Regional level and coordinates mutual aid among the mutual aid regions and between the Regional Level and State Level. The state level also serves as the coordination and communication link between the state and the National emergency response system. The state level operates out of the State Emergency Operations Centre (SEOC). The hierarchical representation of RO with State EOC, Headquarters IRT and its lower level of IRTs at District levels are shown in fig.



District Level IRT: The District level includes cities, Blocks. District authorities manage and coordinate the overall emergency response and recovery activities within their jurisdiction. District Governments are required to use IRT when their Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) is activated or a District emergency is declared. The District Magistrate / DC / RO will issue a Standing Order for formation of IRT at District headquarters / Sub-Division and Block levels. He will ensure that appropriate and experienced officers are selected for IRTs. The complete IRS organizational structure at District level is given in the fig.



Field Level IRT - The Field Level is where emergency response personnel and resources, under the command of responsible officials, carry out tactical decisions and activities in direct response to an incident or threat.

Coordinating Structure:

Coordinating structures aid preparedness and response at all levels of government and within the private sector, communities, and nongovernmental entities. The structures help organize and measure the whole community's capabilities in order to address the requirements of the Response mission area, facilitate problem solving, improve access to response resources, and foster coordination prior to and following an incident.

State Coordinating Structures:

States also leverage the capabilities and resources of line departments and other stakeholders across the state when identifying needs and building capabilities. The coordinating structures at the state level also vary depending on factors such as geography, population, industry, and the capabilities of the districts and local agencies within the state. These structures are also designed to leverage appropriate representatives from across the whole community some of whom may also participate in local or regional coordinating structures.

Line Departments or Emergency Support Function Agencies:

State governments organize their response resources and capabilities through line departments / emergency support agencies. Specific agencies / line departments have proven to be an effective way to bundle and manage resources to deliver core capabilities. The State emergency support agencies are the primary coordinating structures for building, sustaining, and delivering the response core capabilities. Most State agencies support a number of the response core capabilities. In addition, there are responsibilities and actions associated with State departments / agencies that extend beyond the core capabilities and support other response activities, as well as department and agency responsibilities.

The State Disaster Management Plan (SDMP) brings together the capabilities of State departments/ agencies and other State-level assets. State departments / agencies are grouped to work together to deliver core capabilities and support an effective response. Departments and agencies identified for emergency support

function may be selectively activated by SEOC/ SDMA or as directed by the SEC to support response activities in the State or elsewhere.

Lead / Support Agency:

Different disasters require different types of expertise for response and major natural and human made disasters require Lead and Support agencies to deal specific tasks. For example - in case of rescue and relief in natural disaster, it will generally be the local Police and the SDRF/ NDRF, in case of Fire it will be the Fire department, in case of Epidemics and other Biological disasters it will be the Health department that will have to play the lead role and the remaining departments will have to play the supporting role as per requirement and their core competencies.

Table given below summarizes Lead/support agencies for each emergency where lead/support agencies will directly coordinate and supports.

State Wide Network of EOC:

EOC is an offsite facility which will be functioning from the State / District headquarters and which is actually an augmented control room having communication facilities and space to accommodate the various ESFs. During sever incident - an EOC is also established and activated to support field operations and resource coordination. Field Incident Commanders (IC) and EOCs will establish communications when the district / state EOCs.

Basic functions of an EOC includes, but not limited to

- Receive, monitor, and assess disaster information. Keep track of available resources.
- Monitor, assess, and track response units and resource requests. Manage resource deployment for optimal usage.
- Make policy decisions and proclaim local emergencies as needed.
- Provide direction and management for EOC operations through Standard Operations Guide (SOG), set priorities and establish strategies.
- Coordinate operations of all responding units, including law enforcement, fire, medical, logistics etc.
- Augment comprehensive emergency communication from EOC to any field operation when needed or appropriate.
- Maintain EOC security and access control.
- Provide recovery assistance in response to the situations and available resources Keep senior, subordinate and tenant officials informed.
- Keep local jurisdictions (Village/town/City, district and State) informed. Operate a message centre to log and post all key disaster information. Develop and disseminate public information warnings and instructions.
 Provide information to the news media.

Alert and Warning:

Each district within the state is responsible for preparing for a disaster including establishing methods for alerting and warning the public, mobilizing resources and initiating protective actions. At the state level, SEOC

will have a State alert and Warning centre (SAWC), which is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to serve as the official state level point of contact for emergency notifications. From this centre, Warning Centre personnel maintain contact with district warning points, state agencies, central agencies and the National EOC.

Sequence of Events during Disaster:

Two sequences of events are typically associated with disasters: One involves the response and the other involves local / district or State emergency declaration. The response sequence generally describes the emergency response activities to save lives, protect property and preserve the environment. This sequence describes deployment of response teams, activation of emergency management organizations and coordination among the various levels of government. The emergency proclamation sequence outlines the steps to gain expanded emergency authorities needed to mitigate the problem. It also summarizes the steps for requesting state and federal disaster assistance.

Before Impact → Immediate Impact → After Impact is over

Demobilization:

As resources are no longer needed to support the response, or the response activities cease, resources are demobilized. Demobilization includes provisions to address and validate the safe return of resources to their original location and include processes for resource tracking and ensuring applicable reimbursement. Where applicable, the demobilization should include compliance with mutual aid and assistance provisions.

Funds generation:

The Government of West Bengal allocates funds in the State Budget for relief activities. In addition, funds may be available through the State Disaster Response Fund. However, these funds may not be adequate to meet disaster management requirements in the aftermath of large-scale disasters like the September' 2000 flood in the State. In such circumstances, the Government of West Bengal shall explore additional sources of funding through aid, grants, loans etc., as identified in the pre-disaster phase.

Finalizing relief payouts and packages:

Relief packages would include details relating to collection, allocation and disbursal of funds to the affected people. Relief would be provided all the affected families without any discrimination of caste, creed, religion, community or sex whatsoever. Government of West Bengal also starts to provide Disaster Management Kits to the affected families in the year 2013. Each such kit contains all sorts of foods and utensils to survive a family at least 3-4 days without any help of others.

Post Disaster need assessment:

WBSDMA, with assistance from Government departments, district administration and local authorities will document learning from the relief experience, which can be inputs into further mitigation, relief or rehabilitation and reconstruction plans.

Evacuation Plan

A plan is a must for effective, prompt and systematic delivery of a set of actions with minimal lapses. It is therefore necessary to have a well-defined plan for evacuation. The District Disaster Management Authority would be responsible for preparing, practicing / rehearsing, updating and enacting the evacuation plan in case of any emergency. Various components of the evacuation plan are being given below

Identification of vulnerable areas

Earmarking the specific areas prone to specific disasters are the primary objective of planning. The most common disasters that take place in West Bengal are Cyclone, Flood, Heat wave, Earthquake, Landslide etc. Most of the disasters are region specific for example, Northern hilly region is prone to landslide which is absent in the South Bengal region. The settlements around the flood plains of the rivers are the most vulnerable to immediate flood. The local authorities or the DDMAs are the best to identify these places.

Risk Communication

Communication of risk is at the same time essential for ensuring voluntary compliance of disaster mitigation techniques and popularization of risk transfer mechanisms. Public notices should be put up in such areas warning the public of the likely threat. Mass awareness drive should also be launched in the vulnerable areas for communicating the level of threat to which the masses are likely to be affected.

Identification of Safe Places

Safe places in the vicinity of the areas earmarked as being prone to high risk should be identified for temporarily accommodating the evacuated persons. It should be ensured that the areas identified for temporary accommodation of evacuees has sufficient provisions of sanitation, water, electricity and the like. In case the identified area is far enough provision for acquisition of vehicles should be made. Health, Drinking Water and Food and Civil Supplies departments should be entrusted with the responsibility of providing basic civil amenities at the place identified for accommodating the evacuees.

Information Exchange

Standard protocol should be adhered to under which the District EOC routinely exchanges information with various agencies responsible for generating warnings. These include IMD and CWC. At the same time EOC should establish regular contact with various dams and reservoirs operating in the areas so that information pertaining to the discharge of water is communicated to the EOC.

Warning Dissemination

Standard protocol should be set up for warning dissemination and clear cut responsibilities should be allocated for the same. People should be made aware of the manner in which the warning for Dos and Don'ts after the receipt of the evacuation orders should be popularized through various modes and Mock drills should be carried out for ensuring systematic and prompt evacuation.

Air Evacuation and Alternate Routes

For prompt air evacuation requisition form for seeking the help of Indian Air Force should be kept handy and the location (with latitude and longitude) of clear areas for with size and air clearance details should be inventoried.

Traffic regulation

In the event of any disaster or on receipt of warning of any impending disaster incidence the District Magistrate and Superintendent of Police, invoking appropriate provisions of Disaster Management Act, 2005 would ensure that all traffic leading to the areas affected by disaster.

Sendai Framework and Mainstreaming Disaster Management Concerns into Developmental Plans/ Programmes/ Projects

Overview:

The global impacts of climate change are becoming evident and further climate changes are inevitable due to the greenhouse gas emissions already in the atmosphere. Early evidence of climate change impacts are found on economy, damage to environment and lasting impacts on the society. Recurrent droughts and floods are being reported in the State of West Bengal during the last 50 years. Climate change has certainly exacerbated the impacts of natural disasters as can be seen from the never floods in certain districts like Uttar Dinajpur, Dakshin Dinajpur, Malda, Coochbehar and Alipurduar in 2017. Reference to disaster risks are also made in the West Bengal State Plan of Action on Climate Change¹. While the losses to agriculture and related sectors were the major component of losses in the past, climate induced disasters and extreme events have resulted in major losses to industrial and urban infrastructure.

West Bengal towards Mainstreaming Disaster Management and Climate Change Adaption:

The process of development and the kind of development choices made sometimes create disaster risks. A close analysis of the development process with its six aspects namely i) policy, ii) strategy, iii) programming, iv) project / program cycle management, v) external relations and vi) institutional capacity; clearly calls for the need of systematic and more conscious ways of integrating disaster risk reduction (DRR) into development process. Mainstreaming risk reduction should result in institutionalization of appropriate risk reduction measures and should ensure that development plans and programmes do not create new forms of vulnerability.

Child Centric Disaster Risk Reduction:

The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child adopted in 1989 (UN 1989) became the first legally binding international convention to affirm human rights for all children. It stipulates that children have the right to adequate food, water, shelter and education. In disaster situations they ought to be free from abuse, neglect, sexual exploitation or trafficking, and should be able to grow up in a safe and supportive environment. Children are vulnerable due to their age and immature psychosocial understanding of the surrounding.

The situation of West Bengal, with its multi-hazard profile further exacerbate the vulnerability particularly that of children, women and adolescents, especially belonging to disadvantaged and hard-to-reach communities.

This severely affects the development of these communities. Most importantly the education and learning are disrupted due to recurring disasters such as floods and cyclones. Children in schools spend more time in their formative age and it is haven for them. Apart from the natural hazards, physical safety of the children in school campus, laboratories, entry/exit point, playground, roads from home to schools, school buses etc., others hazard like water, gas, fire accidents are increasing day by day both in urban and rural schools.

National School Safety Programme (NSSP): NSSP has begun with a view to building the capacity of officials, teachers and students, carrying out rapid visual survey, retrofitting and non-structural mitigation measures of 200 schools each in three districts of Darjeeling, Jalpaiguri and Cooch Behar. The project has been successfully completed by providing requisite training.

In light of this, the State Government is in helping UNICEF to implement the Comprehensive School Safety & Security (CSSSP) programme in 400 schools.

The concept of Comprehensive School Safety & Security (CSSSP) programme is focusing on three pillars, including 1. Safe Learning environment; 2. DRR in Schools, and 3. Child Protection/ Prevention of violence & Abuse and ensure maximum safety for the children in school to home and home to school. As proposed by the State Government, CSSSP is being piloted in 400 schools of 4 High Priority Districts by UNICEF. The Objective is to develop strategy based on the pilot programme and advocate with State Government for implementation in all schools of the state considering the geographical vulnerability such as Hilly areas, Coastal belt, Flood plain, etc., and level of schools (Primary, Upper Primary and Secondary). However, the CSSSP expected to be standardized to communicate with children, school teachers and community for children's safety and security for risk reduction.

Mitigation Funded Key Projects: In the aftermath of the cyclone Aila of 2009 that ravaged the coastal West Bengal including Sundarban area. It was felt the number of deaths were more in the affected areas due to non-availability of safe shelter buildings in the coastal villages. The Government of Central and State decided on the basis of the report prepared by IIT Kharagpur to undertake construction of multipurpose cyclone shelters in high risk areas of three costal districts of West Bengal. The details of these projects are furnished subsequently.

Prime Minister's National Relief Fund, (PMNRF): 50 Multipurpose Cyclone Shelter (MPCS) were constructed under National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA). These shelters were constructed in the 3 coastal districts and the numbers of shelter are constructed in the three coastal districts.

Total cost of the project is Rs 138.65 crores. The MPCS under the funding of PMNRF has been completed and handed over to the local authorities.

Integrated Coastal Zone Management Project (ICZMP): 25 multipurpose cyclone shelters were to be constructed in the district of South 24 Parganas under World Bank assisted ICZM Project. The total cost of the project is Rs. 105.39 crores. In order to cope with the vulnerability of the population exposed to cyclone, 25 MPCS were proposed out of which 17 numbers of buildings are fully constructed. Handover process of the completed building is under process by the Department.

NCRMP (National Cyclone Risk Mitigation Project): In the three coastal districts of West Bengal i.e. South 24-Pgs., North 24-Pgs. and Purba Medinipur 146 Nos. of Multipurpose Cyclone Shelters are proposed to be constructed under the scheme NCRMP (Phase II) with World Bank aided fund and State Fund in the ratio 75:25. Ministry of Home Affairs, Gol has already given approval in principle for the same in tune of approx. Rs. 500 crore.

Women Centric Disaster Risk Reduction:

A gender perspective to Disaster Risk Reduction helps focusing attention on the distinct gender -specific capacities and vulnerabilities to prevent, prepare, confront, and recover from disasters. Post-disaster reconstruction programs could render women more vulnerable when compared to the pre-disaster situation, defeating the very objective of building back better. An increase in violence against women, domestic violence and divorce rates have been reported in the aftermath of disasters. They become more vulnerable to abuse in disaster situations. They face difficulty in accessing sanitation facilities. There is lack of privacy and increased risk of sexual assault. In some situations, there are risk of girls and young women being ensnared by traffickers or an increase in early marriages. There is a tendency to leave out women from accessing relief and recovery as they do not have control over resources and institutions. Women headed households, single women, and widows find it difficult to access information and necessary financial help for recovery and reconstruction.

Specially Abled People:

Disability is a contextual and evolving concept. The UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) states in its first article: "Persons with disabilities include those who have long - term physical, mental, intellectual or sensory impairments which in interaction with various barriers may hinder their full and effective participation in society on an equal basis with others." The Convention, in its articles 11 and 32, requires that persons with disabilities benefit from and participate in disaster relief, emergency response and disaster risk reduction strategies. The Adoption of the Dhaka Declaration on Disability and Disaster Risk Management, in December 2015, acknowledges: "the importance of linking disability inclusive Disaster Risk Management (DRM) with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) on the understanding that inclusion builds the resilience of the whole of society, safeguards development gains and minimizes disaster losses."

Prime Minister 10 Points Agenda:

The Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi, enunciated a Ten - Point Agenda in his inaugural speech at the Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction 2016, held in New Delhi during November 2016 (AMCDRR), which has also been incorporated in the NDMP. The ten key elements consist of the following:

- 1. All development sectors must imbibe the principles of disaster risk management.
- 2. Risk coverage must include all, starting from poor households to SMEs to multi -national corporations to nation states.
- 3. Women's leadership and greater involvement should be central to disaster risk management
- 4. Invest in risk mapping globally to improve global understanding of nature and disaster risks.
- 5. Leverage technology to enhance the efficiency of disaster risk management efforts.

- 6. Develop a network of universities to work on disaster-related issues.
- 7. Utilise the opportunities provided by social media and mobile technologies for disaster risk reduction.
- 8. Build on local capacity and initiative to enhance disaster risk reduction.
- 9. Make use of every opportunity to learn from disasters and to achieve that there must be studies on the lessons after every disaster.
- 10. Bring about greater cohesion in international response to disasters.

Presently all initiatives has been taken from the state's end to achieve the 10 point agenda. Risk coverage is more and more encouraged where people from all strata are involved to build in awareness on risk. Women involvement in all spheres of disaster management has to be made mandatory. Women are encouraged to join the rescue forces at all level including the Apadamitra. Use of modern technology is encouraged for disaster risk mitigation, monitoring and prevention. Capacity building is being extensively planned for using the technology as well. The state level universities and central universities are already in tune for various projects on Disaster Management. Further plans are on process to involve young researchers to contribute more on ideas for disaster management at all levels. Crowd sourcing may be used to gather and disseminate information on past disasters and impending risks. Community awareness and disaster planning are to be in focus and a bottom up approach for participation as well as decision making process.

Preservation of Cultural Heritage:

Cultural heritage has only recently been recognized as a key aspect within overall frameworks of disaster risk reduction. A general lack of awareness and a lack of prioritization of heritage is one of the key challenges in this area. The relevant disaster management guidelines published by NDMA are, a) cultural heritage sites and precincts and b) museums. Museums are repositories of diverse heritage, both natural as well as cultural, and as institutions they make significant contributions to the socio –cultural development of a community. Museums through the objects and collections they house and display, contribute to regional, state and national identities. Over centuries, the scope and nature of museums expanded from presentation of private collections of artifacts and oddities to institutions that promoted learning through objects collected and presented with a meaningful narrative.

The apex body for the conservation and protection of cultural heritage is the Ministry of Culture (MOCU), which acts through the Archaeological Survey of India. Several national legislations apply to cultural heritage such as:

- Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Sites and Remains (AMASR) ACT 2010, 1958
- Ancient Monuments and Archaeological Sites and Remains Rules, 1959
- Antiquities and Art Treasures Act, 1972 and the Antiquities and Art Treasures Rules, 1973
- State legislations applicable to State Archaeology Monuments and Sites.

The framework for disaster risk reduction comprises of a four -pronged approach, a) Elimination or prevention of the hazard b) Reducing vulnerability c) Reducing exposure and d) Building Capacity. With respect to disaster risk reduction for cultural heritage sites and precincts, certain aspects need to be considered: a) Preserving and retaining cultural heritage values b) Retaining authenticity c) Using traditional technologies and skill and indigenous knowledge systems d) A degree of acceptable risk should be established for the cultural heritage site or precinct and such a threshold should inform risk reduction interventions.

Lessons Learnt:

COVID 19 Global Pandemic: The extraordinary situation that arose due to the outbreak of COVID 19 invoked a new dimension altogether in the field of health hazard of disaster management. The Central Government is now functioning under the Disaster Management Act, 2005. Disaster Management Department being the nodal department for all disaster is now handling the situation in close liaison with all the line departments especially Department of Health and Family Welfare.

- During the COVID 19 Pandemic situation, round the clock guidance and support has been provided to the stranded people and migrant labourers from the Emergency Operation Centre from State to District level.
- Round the clock Control Room in the form of COVID Coordination Centre remained functional to provide support to COVID victims like hospitalization, ambulance arrangement, expert consultation and various issues.

- An Application was developed to help the migrant laborers of the State stranded in other States. Sneher
 Paras, the App by which Rs. 44,00,29,000 has been directly debited to the bank account of the verified
 applicants.
- Rs.19.5 Crores from PM Cares fund had been utilized as the transportation cost of the migrant labourers and an additional amount of more than 11 crores rupees utilised for transportation and providing food and safe shelters for migrants.
- Extensive IEC sensitization has been done for creating awareness on COVID 19 and related health issues.
- Volunteers have been deployed at the major cultural functions and festivals to prevent the spread of COVID
 19
- Guidelines have been issued on how to use the MPCS and other flood shelters during COVID 19 pandemic.
- Food, medical and lodging has been given to the stranded migrant population to ensure that no one lives without food.
- Coordination to deport the migrant population to their respective destinations has been done and was ensured that no one stays stranded.

RESCUE & RELIEF OPEARATION DURING DISASTER IN PANDEMIC SITUATION:

West Bengal was affected by the Super Cyclone "AMPHAN" on 20th May, 2020 during COVID-19 pandemic situation. The rescue & relief operation during cyclone faced a unique challenge as pandemic norms issued by Ministry of Health & Family Affairs, Government of India were in force. The State Executive Committee of West Bengal (SEC) headed by Chief Secretary of West Bengal enforced DM Act, 2005 all over the state. The SEC structured Department of Health & Family Affairs as the nodal department to tackle the spread of COVID-19 pandemic and Department of Disaster Management & Civil Defence was tasked to coordinate with other departments & districts for providing all administrative & financial support in preparation, evacuation, relief & rescue work, mitigation and rehabilitation.

Major activities undertaken by the Department:

During the situation arisen due to the preventive restriction imposed due to outbreak of COVID-19, the major activities undertook by the department are as follows –

- A. Allocation & distribution of relief articles.
- B. Providing quarantine facilities
- C. Providing temporary accommodation, food & clothing's to homeless people, including migrant labourers, stranded due to lockdown measures.
- D. Running EOCs round the clock to facilitate assisted information exchange and promote services for people to get required support from line departments, support agencies, community and local government.
- E. Facilitate uninterrupted supply of essential commodities and services.
- F. Awareness generation and put effort to bring behaviour change through capacity building, demonstration and enforcement of advisories issues by Government.
- G. Ensure execution of advisory issued by state government by coordinating respective nodal persons of Police Administration, Transport department, Health & Family Welfare department, PRIs, Municipalities and cooperatives & societies.
- H. Documentation and reporting.

At present the activities of the department has increased significantly and its magnitude has also multiplied. In addition to the above mentioned activities, under the Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) activities - Disaster risk mapping and preparedness, vulnerability mapping, providing practical ideas to reduce disaster risk, capacity building of the vulnerable communities through continuous awareness generation and hands on training on mask wearing, hand washing, maintain cleanliness, maintain common health & hygiene, adopting new guideline to get different government facilities, safe disposal of waste, providing services by maintaining PPE, institutional support and maintaining liaison with all support organizations in these restriction phase of social distancing are some of the important activities that the department undertook.

Awareness Generation and Capacity Building:

It is observed that Disaster Management Officers and other Government officials are conducting different awareness programme and training programmes at every parts of the state. Therefore, a general and consolidated guideline on awareness generation & capacity building may be prepared for sustaining those initiatives in an uniformed manner.

Moreover, the responsible agencies should undertake preparedness exercise for the Ropeways and Cable Bridges collapse during pandemic situation when regular activities are suspended.

Objective

- i) To enhance capacities of search & rescue operation personnel, evacuation teams and community in the tough time of existing threat of COVID-19.
- ii) To understand the risk of COVID-19, scientific facts, its development, mode of transmission and its impact in different activities under Disaster Management.
- iii) To know the preventive measures and standard method of implementation of different guideline issued by Government.
- iv) To ensure optimum protection from COVID-19 in activities like relief distribution, running temporary shelters and other related activities.
- v) To ensure public participation in developing knowledge base and encourage all to become COVID-19 Heroes.

Target Population:

District/Sub-Divisional/Block Officials, Disaster Management Officers, Disaster Management Professional, Police Personnel, Civil Defence Volunteers, Front line Health Workers like ANM, ASHA, Nurses, Cleaners, Aya; PRI members, Officers and Staffs of MC & Municipalities, SHG Members, AWW, NGO volunteers, CBO Volunteers.

Standard Operation Procedure for Running State Control Room for COVID-19

- i) State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC) / Control Room have been made functional for smooth coordination & support to Public, Departments and Other Support Agencies in regard to COVID-19
- ii) On receiving calls, state EOC personnel will politely talk with all callers by proper greeting & start communication by saying "State Control Room, Nabanna, How can I help you?"
- iii) Calls received are to be recorded in the log book as per standard format.
- iv) State Emergency Operation Centre (SEOC) / Control Room, Nabanna will work in close coordination with following five important centres apart from Health Department's Helpline and Police Control Rooms -
 - A. Transport and Movement Centre
 - B. PPE/Mask/Sanitizer Availability Centre
 - C. Essential and Civil Supplies Enforcement Centre
 - D. Perishable Commodities Facilitation Centre
 - E. Power and allied Services Centre

Any issues related to transport / essential commodities etc mentioned above should be brought into notice of the senior officers present in the Control room.

- v) Issues related to police, mass gathering / obstruction are to be informed to DG Control Room / Lal Bazar Control Room and brought to the notice of notice of Senior Police Officer.
- vi) Issued related to district administration (food, ration, transportations, water, ambulance etc.) to be informed to respective district at their control rooms, annexed as "Annexure-I"
- vii) Issues related to people stranded in other states to be informed respective state help line numbers, helpline of state authorities are to be shared with callers as per the "Annexure-II".
- viii) SEOC staffs and volunteers will perform their duties as per schedule.

- ix) As per standard practice, CD Volunteers should not leave SEOC unless his reliever resumes duty. The pending issues are to be detailed & handed over to staffs joining for next shift in log book.
- x) Summary report of calls received and issues resolved / unresolved or need special attention to be submitted to DMCD Duty Officer, SEOC.

Guidelines for accommodation of people in Relief Camps/ Shelters during Cyclone:


- A. The existing flood shelters or MPCS can be used for accommodating the evacuated / rescued people by maintaining social distancing norms. Restrictions on movement are to be strictly enforced in time of movement restriction.
- B. Arrangement of hand sanitizer/ soap, mask and infrared thermometer should be made for the relief camp/ shelter.
- C. Proper sanitization of all floor, gate / door, door handle & lock, toilets, water taps, eclectic switches, staircase and kitchen of the building has to be done every day to maintain good health of the people staying in the shelter.
- D. The floor plan of relief shelters has to be done in such a way so as to maintain social distancing. The accessibility route to the nearby health centre has to be pre-planned and mapped before setting up the camp. Also arrangements for immediate shifting of the sick people to the health centre should be in place.
- E. Arrangement of nutritious food and safe drinking water has to be made to the people staying in the camps. Hygiene has to be maintained during preparation of food. While serving the food social distancing norms should be maintained.
- F. The rescue teams may have to be equipped with sanitizer / masks and PPE. Hence arrangements for same may have to be made at district levels.
- G. Since minimum one metre social distancing is required for every person housed in relief camps, the number of relief camps may be increased to maintain the social distance norms. The District Disaster Management Plans be modified accordingly to factor in relief operations in view of COVID-19 so that evacuation/ gruel kitchen/ relief shelters are all modified to be COVID-19 SOP compliant.

Amphan:

The Super Cyclone of the decade in Bay of Bengal ravaged the southern parts of Bengal at a speed of 155 to 165 km/hr gusting to 185km/hr. The movement of Super Cyclone Amphan was regularly tracked by State Government. The Super Cyclone made landfall near Sagar Islands at 2.30 pm afternoon of 20th May 2020. There was an accompanying storm surge of 15 feet as water rushed inland and flooded many coastal and riverine villages.

Rescue & Relief operation:

- Affected Districts: 16 districts. Crop damage reported in 13 districts. Roads under PWD damaged in 16 districts.
- 2. Number of people affected: More than 60% of State population.
- 3. Relief Camp Opened: 6,123
- 4. No. of People in Relief Camps: 10.7 lakhs



5. Number of Boats Deployed: 406

6. Water pouches distributed: 1.5 crore

7. Medical support: 3133 Medical Teams were deployed

The experience of this Cyclone gave the SDMA a valuable lesson of early preparedness and earliest response is the major requirement to reduce loss. Moreover, awareness at the community level has to be build up more by doing intensive capacity building at all levels.

YAAS:

The Very Severe Cyclonic Storm YAAS caused unprecedented tidal waves and high speed wind with heavy rainfall that caused severe damage to land and property in West Bengal from 25th May, 2021 to 29th May, 2021 as the Very Severe Cyclone made landfall near Dharma in Orissa on the 26th May, 2021. Four tornados also occurred as part of the YAAS cyclonic storm in districts North 24 Parganas, Birbhum and Hooghly.

Rescue & Relief Operation: Affected Districts: 18 districts; Relief Camp Opened: 15,215; No. of People in People Evacuated: 10.7 lakhs; Water pouches distributed: 55.89 lakhs.

The experience of this Cyclone gave the SDMA a valuable lesson of early preparedness and earliest response to the major requirement is the key to reduce loss.

CHAPTER 8

Financial Arrangement

Section 46, 47 & 48 of Disaster Management Act, 2005 adopted the formation of:-

- 1. National Disaster Response Fund,
- 2. National Disaster Mitigation Fund,
- 3. State & District Disaster Response Fund & Mitigation Fund.

They are the separate Fund available to the National or State Executive Committee and District Disaster Management Authority to be utilized for Mitigation and Management of any kind of disaster.

The Government of India constituted NDRF vide Gazette Notification no. 1995 dated 28th September, 2010 and constituted NDMF vide Gazette Notification no. 512 dated 5th February, 2021. The Government of West Bengal constituted SDRF vide Gazette Notification no.1822-F.B dated 12 th September, 2011 and constituted SDMF vide Gazette Notification no.866-F.B/N/2S-1(05)/2015 dated 27th December, 2021.

Norms of the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India provide that the funds available under SDRF / NDRF be utilized for immediate relief and restorations of identified lifeline services only. These funds are not allowed to be utilized for new constructions. Line departments should therefore prepare departmental guidelines for the identification of works to be covered by SDRF / NDRF resources. In accordance with the provisions of Disaster Management Act, 2005 all departments have to ensure adequate financial arrangements in their departmental budget so as to ensure timely discharge of their disaster management related functions. It is at the same time the responsibility of the line departments to undertake vulnerability assessment of their departmental infrastructure and ensure allocation of funds in their departmental plan and budget for vulnerability reduction.

Funding Mechanism at Various Levels

To ensure the long-term sustainance and permanency of the organization, funds needs to be generated and deployed on an-ongoing basis. Financial mechanism for disaster management is already in place at the national, state and district levels. Moreover there are diverse projects, programs and initiatives catering to different phases of disaster reduction at the nation, state and district levels.

Union Government Level:

National Disaster Response Fund

This fund has been created under the legal framework of Disaster Management Act, 2005. Under the existing guidelines, it is available for assistance from avalanches, cyclones, cloudbursts, drought, earthquake/tsunami, fire, flood, hailstorm, landslides, pest attack and frost, heat and cold waves. In case of calamity of severe nature, when the State Disaster Response Fund is not sufficient to meet the relief requirements, additional central assistance is provided from NDRF to the State Government by laid down procedures.

- Released fund of NDRF for West Bengal for year 2020-21 was Rs. 2250.28 crores
- Released fund of NDRF for West Bengal for year 2021-22 was Rs. 300.00 crores

Prime Minister's National Relief Fund (PMNRF)

The Prime Ministers National Relief Fund (PMNRF) provides for immediate relief to families of those killed in natural calamities and to the victims of major accidents and riots. The fund is raised entirely by public contributions.

State Level Fund:

Budget

The WBSDMA would submit to the State government for approval of a budget in the prescribed format for the next financial year showing the estimated receipts and expenditure, and the sums which would be required from the State Government during that financial year. The GoWB also allocates funds in the State Budget for relief activities. In addition, funds may be available through the State Disaster Response Fund.

State Disaster Response Fund

The State Disaster Response Fund shall be used only for meeting the expenditure for providing immediate relief to the victims of cyclone, drought, earthquake, fire, flood, tsunami, hailstorm, landslide, avalanche, cloud burst, pest attack, frost and cold wave. While the state can draw from State Disaster Response Fund for the emergency response and relief, there are provisions to utilize the funds released from National Disaster Response Fund in another fiscal under State Disaster Response Fund. In case the same state faces another severe disaster during the same year, no reduction will be made while releasing assistance from the National Disaster Response Fund. The state-specific disasters within the local context in the State, which are not included in the notified list of disasters eligible for assistance from State Disaster Response Fund /National Disaster Response Fund, can be met from State Disaster Response Fund within the limit of 10 percent of the annual funds allocation of the State Disaster Response Fund.

To carry out Emergency Response & Relief activities after any disaster the State Disaster Response Fund is made available to the Relief Commissioner, Department of Disaster Management under which the Central Government will share 75% and the Govt. of West Bengal has to share 25% as per the recommendation of 13th Finance Commission.

- SDRF for West Bengal for year 2010-11 to 2014-15 was **Rs. 2,774.54 crores** out of which Central share was **Rs. 2,080.90 crore** and State share was **Rs. 693.64 crore**.
- SDRF for West Bengal allocation for 2015-16 to 2019-20 as Rs. 2853.00 crores.
- SDRF for West Bengal for year 2020-21 was **Rs. 1348.00 crores** out of which Central share was **Rs. 1,011.00 crores** and State share was **Rs. 337.00 crores**.
- SDRF for West Bengal for year 2021-22 was **Rs. 1348.00 crores** out of which Central share was **Rs. 1,011.00 crores** and State share was **Rs. 337.00 crores**.

Chief Minister Relief Fund

This provides for immediate support to the distressed people affected either by natural calamities, or manmade disasters like stampede, road, air or railway accidents.

Other Source of Funds:

Public Private Partnership, Grants-in-Aid, Loan, Disaster Bonds, Donations, Recovery Measures, UN Agencies, World Bank, Corporate Social Responsibility.

Funds Disbursement and Audit

The funds raised from funding agencies are usually accompanied by strongest disbursement and usage restrictions. It is therefore important to monitor disbursement of such funds to ensure that none of the covenants are breached. State Authority monitors and control the release of fund by:

- 1. Prioritizing resources allocation across approved projects;
- 2. Establishing mechanisms (like a chain of banks, collection centers, nature of accounts, spread, etc.) for collection of finds; and
- 3. On-going monitoring and control of fund usage during actual project implementation.



Capacity Developments

Section 2 (b) of DM Act, 2005 delineates the Capacity Building measures to be under taken. As per the Sub-Section (i) of Section 2 (b) Capacity Building includes identification of existing resources and resources to be acquired or created. As per Sub Section (ii) of Section 2 (b) acquiring or creating resources identified under Sub-Clause (i). Sub Section (iii) emphasizes on organization and training of personal and coordination of such training effective management of disaster. Sub Section 2 (i) of Section 3 of DM act, postulate that National Disaster Management Authority take Capacity Building measures for dealing with threatening disaster situation or disaster. Under the sub section 2 (j) of Section 10, the National Executive Committee plan and coordinate specialised training programme on disaster management for different level of officers, employees and voluntary rescue workers. As per the Section 11 (1), Sub-Section 3 (c), The National Disaster Management Plan shall include measures to be taken for preparedness and capacity building to effectively respond to any threatening disaster.

Training courses on various disaster management topics regarding National Disaster Management (NDM) conducts by Netaji Subhas Administrative Training Institute, Kolkata throughout the year. The subjects are mostly on Climate Change & Disaster Management, Drought Risk Mitigation & Management, Flood & Cyclone Risk Mitigation & Management, Earthquake & Landslide Risk Mitigation, School Safety & Disaster Management etc. The District Regional Training Centres (RTCs) also conduct trainings on same topics at district level on regular basis.

National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) conducts different types of training such as GIS in Disaster Risk Management, Wetland & Eco system restoration for DRR, CNERMP, Urban Flood Mitigation etc. These trainings are conducted mostly in Delhi. NDRF & SDRF

A. National Disaster Response Force (NDRF)


The National Disaster Management Authority (NDRF) was constituted under Section 44 of the Disaster Management Act, 2005 for a specialized response to natural and man-made disasters.

NDRF has proved its importance in achieving this vision by highly skilled rescue and relief operations, regular and intensive training and re-training, familiarization exercises within the area of responsibility of respective NDRF Battalions, carrying out mock drills and joint exercises with the various stakeholders.

The NDRF unit comprise of approximately eleven hundred (1100) personnel. These units are carved out of normal CAPF units and individuals (all ranks) are posted on deputation for a period of 5-7 years. Among its 12 NDRF Battalions, 2nd Battalion of NDRF is located in West Bengal with its HQ at Haringhata, Nadia and two RRCs at Rajarhat & at Siliguri with 03 teams reserved.

The NDRF Battalions are organized in the form of teams and sub-teams. There are 18 operational teams with strength of 47 individuals in each NDRF Battalion and they are further divided into many sub-teams. The organizational structure of NDRF Search and Rescue (SAR) team is as under:-

NDRF takes part in evacuation, rescue operation, relief activities in critical situation, state level Mock Exercises. Every year NDRF organizes joint mock drill with State Government Departments and agencies, FAMEX in collaboration with District Administration for at least 8 Districts.

B. State Disaster Response Force (SDRF):

As per Section 3.4.5 of National Policy on Disaster Management, 2009, the SDRF also constituted for quickly responding to disasters. These SDRF are placed strategically at suitable locations well connected to the airport, rail heads and roads for their immediate deployment at the disaster sites. In West Bengal Disaster Management Groups (DMG) were constituted for Kolkata and DMG–Bengal. DMG Kolkata has its HQ at PTS, Kolkata. Under DMG–West Bengal, 07(seven) self-contained Squads in DMG, WBP were constituted with State Armed Police (SAP) with HQ at Barrackpore, North 24 Parganas.

The SDRF takes part in evacuation and rescue operations especially in regular events like fire incidents, rescue from collapsed buildings, drowning, boat capsize, flood management, cyclone management, earthquake management, landslide management and associated incidents.

The SDRF are also be used for Community Capacity Building and Awareness Generation programmes within the State. During these programmes, SDRF also familiarize themselves with terrain, critical buildings and other existing infrastructure for prompt responses at the time of disasters and simultaneously work with the community, including school children, village volunteers and other stakeholders on what to do during disasters.



ANNEXURE II:

Dos and Don'ts for various Hazards:

Cyclone Safety: Don'ts before and during a cyclone:

- Have your dwellings checked before a cyclone season starts and carry out whatever repairs that are needed.
- Talk to children and explain about cyclones without scaring them.
- Create storm awareness by discussing effects of a cyclonic storm with family members so that everyone knows what one can and should do in an emergency. This helps to remove fear and anxiety and prepares everyone to respond to emergencies quickly.
- Keep your valuables and documents in containers, which cannot be damaged by water.
- Keep information about your blood group.
- Keep lanterns filled with kerosene, torches and spare batteries. These must be kept in secure places and handy.
- Make plans for people who are either sick, suffer from disabilities, aged and children. Store up at least seven-day stock of essential food articles, medicines and water supply. Keep blankets & clothes ready for making beds. Also keep cotton bandages.
- Store some wooden boards so that they can be used to cover windows.
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed. Remove damaged and decayed parts of trees to make them resist wind and reduce the potential for damage. Cut weak branches and make winds blow through.
- All doors, windows and openings should be secured.
- Continue to listen to warning bulletins and keep in touch with local officials. Keep radio sets in working condition. Battery powered radio sets are desirable.
- Evacuate people to places of safety when advised. Take steps to protect your assets.
- Store extra drinking water in covered vessels. Remain calm.

Don'ts during a Cyclone:

- During the storm do not venture out unless advised to evacuate.
- If you have a vehicle and wish to move out of your house, leave early before the onset of a cyclone. It is often best to stay at home.
- Avoid remaining on the top floor of dwellings. Stay close to the ground.
- Fishermen are advised not to venture out into the sea. They should keep boats and rafts tied up in a safe place.
- Avoid taking shelters near old and damaged buildings or near trees. Do not touch power lines. One may get electrocuted.

Dos after the Cyclone:

- Watch out for broken glass and other sharp items in debris.
- Watch out for snakes and insects. Try to call for help.
- It is advisable to wait for the "all clear message" on radio and TV networks.
- Listen to the advice of local officials and emergency workers. Be sure that the storm has subsided before venturing out.
- Wait for emergency relief teams to arrive. It may take a little time before relief becomes effective.
- Stay away from flooded areas.
- Fishermen should wait for at least 24 hours before resuming fishing. Volunteer to help people who may need assistance like:

- Locating places where dead bodies can be kept until they are disposed off Organising clearing- up so that normalcy returns as soon as possible
- Bringing evacuated people back home and in recording damages suffered Rendering first aid to the wounded
- Donating blood

Earthquake safety:

Dos and don'ts before Earthquake:

- Tell the facts about earthquake to your family members
- Construct new buildings with earthquake resistant method and strengthen the old buildings
- Insure your house and family members
- Take the training for first aid and firefighting Do not keep cots near the glass window
- Do not keep heavy and fragile things in the selves
- Do not hang photo frames, mirrors, or glasses up your bed
- Keep your important documents, some cash and necessary articles ready in a bag Get your house insured before the earthquake
- Identify special skills of neighbor (medical, technical) so that it can be utilised.

Dos and don'ts during Earthquake:

- Do not panic
- If already inside, then Stay indoors! Get under a heavy desk or table and hang on to it. If fire breaks out, drop on the floor and crawl towards the exist
- If you are out doors during the quake, keep away from buildings, trees and electricity lines. Walk towards open places, in a calm and composed manner.
- If you are driving, quickly but carefully move your car as far out of traffic as possible and stop. Do not stop
 on or under a bridge or overpass or under trees, light posts, power lines, or signs. Stay inside the car until
 shaking stops
- If you are in a school, get under a desk or table and hold on

Dos and don'ts after the Earthquake:

- Do not be afraid of the aftershocks Listen to radio-TV and other media for Government Announcement.
- Check for injuries to yourself and those around you. Take first aid where you can extinguish fire, where u can.
- Examine walls, floors, doors, staircases and windows to make sure that the building is not in danger of collapsing.
- Do not enter into the unsafe or risky houses or buildings.
- Inspect for Gas leaks-If you smell gas or hear blowing or hissing noises, open a window and quickly leave the building. Don't light your kitchen stove if you suspect a gas leak. Do not keep telephone lines busy unnecessarily.
- Switch off electric lines.

Fire safety:

Dos:

- Buy Fireworks from the licensed shop. Keep fireworks in a closed box
- Store crackers away from source of fire or inflammation Follow all safety precautions issued with the fire works

- Go to open spaces like playgrounds, fields Light them at arm's length using a taper. Stand back while lighting the crackers Discard used fireworks in a bucket of water
- Keep buckets of water and blankets ready, in case a firebreak out. Wear thick cotton clothes for maximum safety from fire.
- If clothes catch fire, Stop, Drop and Roll
- In case of uncontrolled fire wrap the victim in a blanket, till it stops.
- In case of burns splash tap water (not ice water), the process may be repeated till the burning sensation reduces.
- If fingers or toes are burned, separate them with dry, sterile, non-adhesive dressings. Make sure the burn
 victim is breathing, if breathing has stopped or if the victim's airway is blocked then open the airway and if
 necessary, begin rescue breathing.
- Elevate the burned area and protect it from pressure and friction.
- Cover the area of the burn with a moist sterile bandage, of clean cloth (do not use blanket or towel for healing burns).
- Consult the doctor as soon as possible for the proper medication Consult an ophthalmologist immediately in case of eye injuries.
- Do contact at the Fire Brigade (Tel. No. 101), for getting the details of the doctors on duty during the festival.

Don'ts:

- Don't burn crackers in crowded, congested places, narrow lanes or inside the house. Don't let children burst crackers unaccompanied by an adult
- Don't put fireworks in your pocket or throw them
- Don't cover crackers with tin containers or glass bottles for extra sound effect
- Don't dare to examine unburst crackers...leave it!! Light a new cracker
- Don't show the Dare-devilry of lighting crackers on own hands
- Don't use fireworks inside a vehicle
- Avoid long loose clothes, as they are fast in catching fire
- Don't remove burnt clothing (unless it comes off easily), but do ensure that the victim is not still in contact with smouldering materials.
- Don't apply adhesive dressing on the burnt area. Don't break the burst blister.

Flood Safety Dos and Don'ts after flood:

- There is a possibility of spread of water borne diseases after flood, and hence medical treatment should be taken immediately.
- Do not enter deep, unknown waters.
- Do not go near the riverbank even after the floodwater has receded. Sprinkle medicines in the stagnant dirty water.
- Inspect your house for any cracks or other damage. Check all the walls, floor, ceiling, doors and windows, so that any chance of house falling down can be known and you can be aware about the immediate danger.
- If the floodwater has entered the house or has surrounded the house, then it is advisable not to enter such house.
- Keep listening to weather forecast on radio and television. Move to your residence only when instructed by the competent authority. It is not safe to believe that the problems have ended after the flood water have receded
- Inform the competent authority/officer for restoration of the necessary connections like gas, electricity, telephone, drainage, etc.

- Beware of the various insects or poisonous snakes that may have been dragged inside the house along with the floodwater.
- Destroy the food commodities that have been affected by floodwater.
- Check properly all the electric circuits, floor level furnace, boilers, gas cylinders, or electric equipment like motor pump etc. Check whether any inflammable or explosive item has not entered along with the floodwater.
- Switch off the main electric supply, if any damage is noticed to the electric equipment. If you find any breakage in the drainage system stop using latrines and do not use tap water.
- Do not use polluted water.
- Sewerage system should be checked and any damage should be repaired immediately so as to curtail spread of diseases.
- Empty the water clogged in the basement slowly with help of water pump so that damage to infrastructure can be minimized
- Check gas leakage which can be known by smell of gas or by hearing the sound of leakage; immediately
 open all windows and leave the house.
- Boil drinking water before usage and drink chlorinated water. Eat safe food.
- Rescue work should be undertaken immediately after flood situation as per the instruction. Do not follow any shortcut for rescue work.
- Do not try to leave the safe shelter to go back home until the local officials declare normalcy after flood and instruction to return home are not given.

Tsunami Safety:

Dos and Don'ts before Tsunami:

- Be familiar with the tsunami warning signals. People living along the coast should consider an earthquake
 or a sizable ground rumbling as a warning signal. A noticeable rapid rise or fall in coastal waters is also a
 sign that a tsunami is approaching. Make sure all family members know how to respond to a tsunami. Make
 evacuation plans. Pick an inland location that is elevated.
- After an earthquake or other natural disaster, roads in and out of the vicinity may be blocked, so pick more than one evacuation route.
- Teach family members how and when to turn off gas, electricity, and water Children should be taught in advance about the evacuation plans.
- Prepare emergency kit beforehand. The emergency kit should contain Flashlight and extra batteries, batteryoperated radio and extra batteries, First aid kit Emergency food and water, essential medicines etc.

Dos and Don'ts during Tsunami:

- Listen to a radio or television to get the latest emergency information, and be ready to evacuate if asked to do so.
- If you hear a tsunami warning, move at once to higher ground and stay there until local authorities say it is safe to return home.
- Move in an orderly, calm and safe manner to the evacuation site.
- Stay away from the beach. Never go down to the beach to watch a tsunami come in. If you can see the wave you are too close to escape it.
- Return home only after authorities advise it is safe to do so.

Dos and Don'ts after Tsunami:

- Stay tuned to a battery-operated radio for the latest emergency information. Help injured or trapped persons.
- Stay out of damaged buildings. Return home only when authorities say it is safe. Enter your home with caution. Use a flashlight/torch when entering damaged buildings. Check for electrical shorts and live wires.

- Do not use appliances or lights until an electrician has checked the electrical system. Open windows and doors to help dry the building.
- Shovel mud while it is still moist to give walls and floors an opportunity to dry. Check food supplies and test drinking water.
- Fresh food that has come in contact with flood waters may be contaminated and should be thrown out.

Dos and Don'ts during Landslide:

Do's

- Stay away from the slide area. There may be danger of additional slides.
- Check for injured and trapped persons near the slide area. Give first aid if trained.
- Remember to help your neighbours who may require special assistance--infants, elderly people, and people with disabilities.
- Listen to a radio or television for the latest emergency information.
- Stay away from the slide area. There may be danger of additional slides.
- Check for damaged utility lines. Report any damage to the utility company.
- Check the building foundation, chimney, and surrounding land for damage.
- Replant damaged ground as soon as possible since erosion caused by loss of ground cover can lead to flash flooding.
- Prepare tour to hilly region according to information given by weather department or news.
- Move away from landslide path or downstream valleys quickly without wasting time.
- Keep drains clean and inspect drains for litter, leaves, plastic bags, rubble etc.
- Keep the weep holes open.
- Grow more trees that can hold the soil through roots.
- Listen for unusual sounds such as trees cracking or boulders knocking together.
- Stay alert, awake and active (3A's) during the impact or probability of impact.
- Locate and go to shelters.
- Try to stay with your family and companions.

Don'ts

- Try to avoid construction and staying in vulnerable areas;
- Do not panic and loose energy by crying;
- Do not touch or walk over loose material and electrical wiring or pole;
- Do not built houses near steep slopes and near drainage path;
- Do not drink contaminated water directly from rivers, springs, wells but rain water if collected directly without is fine;
- Do not move an injured person without rendering first aid unless the casualty is in immediate danger.

Lightning Safety:

Dos during Lightning:

- Take refuge in a house. Preferably in a pucca house;
- If working outdoor or in a field without a shelter, squat to the ground level, but don't lie down and sit in a cramped position;
- If one is in a vehicle, roll up the windows;
- Stay away from snapped electrical wires;

- Stay away from water bodies;
- Keep a safe distance from electrical wires and post;
- Avoid fishing during a thunderstorm;
- Remove all electronic gadgets from the plug point;
- Stay away from roof-tops, windows and balcony;
- Have proper earthing in your house.

Don'ts during Lightning:

- Don't take shelter under a tree. Keep a safe distance of at least 13 feet from trees.
- Don't use electrical and electronic gadgets.

Do's and Don'ts in Cold Wave:

Before

- Listen to the radio; watch TV, read newspapers for local weather forecast to know if a cold wave is round the corner.
- Stock adequate winter clothing. Multiple layers of clothing are more helpful.
- Keep emergency supplies ready.
- An increased likelihood of various illnesses like flu, running/ stuffy nose or nosebleed, which usually set in
 or get aggravated due to prolonged exposure to cold. Consult the doctor for symptoms like these.

During

- Follow weather information and emergency procedure information closely and act as advised.
- Stay indoors as much as possible and minimize travel to prevent exposure to cold wind.
- Wear multiple layers of loose fitting, lightweight, windproof warm woolen clothing rather than one layer of heavy clothing. Tight clothing reduces blood circulation.
- Keep yourself dry. If wet, then cover your head, neck, hands and toes adequately as the majority of heat loss occurs through these body parts.
- Prefer mittens over gloves. Mittens provide more warmth and insulation from cold, as fingers share their warmth and expose less surface area to the cold.
- Use hats and mufflers to prevent heat loss, Wear insulated / waterproof shoes.
- Eat healthy food to maintain the equilibrium of body temperature.
- Drink hot fluids regularly, as this will maintain body heat to fight cold.
- Take care of elderly people and children and check on neighbours who live alone, especially the elderly about their well-being.
- Store essential supply as per requirement. Store adequate water as pipes may freeze.
- Follow the guide on heat insulation for non-industrial buildings and take necessary preparedness measures.
- Watch out for symptoms of frostbite like numbness, white or pale appearance on fingers, toes, earlobes and the tip of the nose, while exposed to cold waves.
- Treat the areas affected by frostbite in warm (not hot) water (the temperature should be comfortable to touch for unaffected parts of the body).
- Do not ignore shivering. It is an important first sign that the body is losing heat and is a signal to quickly return indoors.
- Seek medical attention as soon as possible for someone suffering from Frostbite/Hypothermia.
- Move pet-animals indoors. Likewise, protect livestock or domestic animals from cold weather by moving them inside.

- Severe exposure to cold wave can lead to Hypothermia a decrease in body temperature which can cause shivering, difficulty in speaking, sleepiness, stiff muscles, heavy breathing, weakness and/or loss of consciousness. Hypothermia is a medical emergency that needs immediate medical attention.
- Consult doctor for symptoms like various illnesses, running/stuffy nose particularly during the period of COVID -19.

In the case of hypothermia

- Get the person into a warm place and change clothes.
- Warm the person's body with skin-to-skin contact, dry layers of blankets, clothes, towels, or sheets.
- Give warm drinks to help increase body temperature. Do not give alcohol.
- Seek medical attention if the condition worsens.

Don'ts

- Avoid prolonged exposure to cold.
- Don't drink alcohol. It reduces your body temperature; it actually narrows your blood vessels, particularly those in the hands, which can increase the risk of hypothermia.
- Do not massage the frostbitten area. This can cause more damage.
- Do not give the affected person any fluids unless fully alert.

Do's and Don'ts in Heat Wave:

Do's for All

- Listen to the radio; watch TV, read newspapers for local weather news;
- Drink sufficient waters- even if not thirsty;
- Use ORS (Oral Rehydration Solution), homemade drinks like Lassi, lemon water, butter milk etc. to keep yourself hydrated;
- Wear lightweight, light-coloured, loose, cotton clothes;
- Cover your head: Use a cloth, hat or umbrella;
- Stay indoor as much as possible;
- Keep your home cool, use curtains, shutters or sunshade and open windows at night;
- Use fan, damp clothing and take bath in cold water frequently;
- Keep animals in shade and give them plenty of water to drink.

Do's for Employers and Workers

- Provide cool drinking water near work place;
- Schedule strenuous jobs to cooler times of the day;
- Increase the frequency and length of rest breaks for outdoor activities;
- Pregnant workers and workers with a medical condition should be given additional attention.

Don'ts

- Avoid going out in the sun, especially during midday;
- Avoid strenuous activities when outside in the midday;
- Do not go out barefoot;
- Avoid alcohol, tea, coffee and carbonated soft drinks, which dehydrates the body;
- Avoid high-protein food and do not eat stale food;
- Do not leave children or pets in parked vehicles- as they may get affected by Heat Wave.
